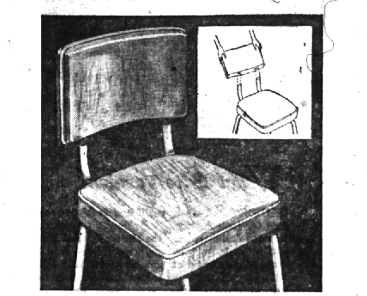
Association Plans White Elephant Sale

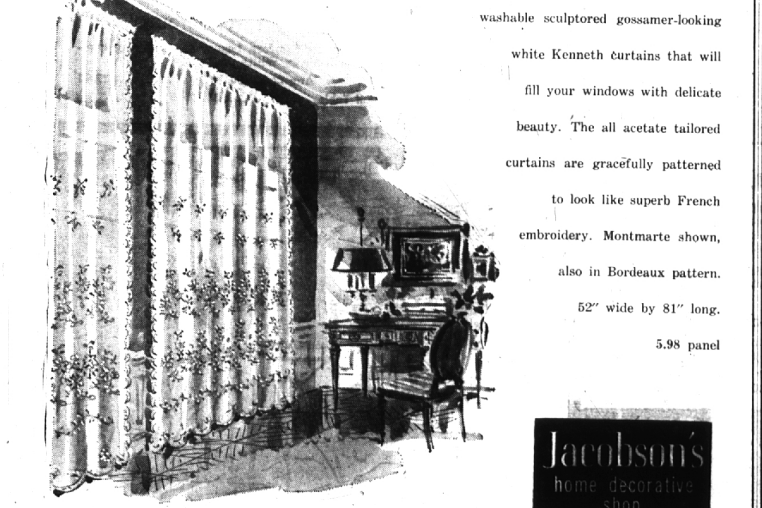

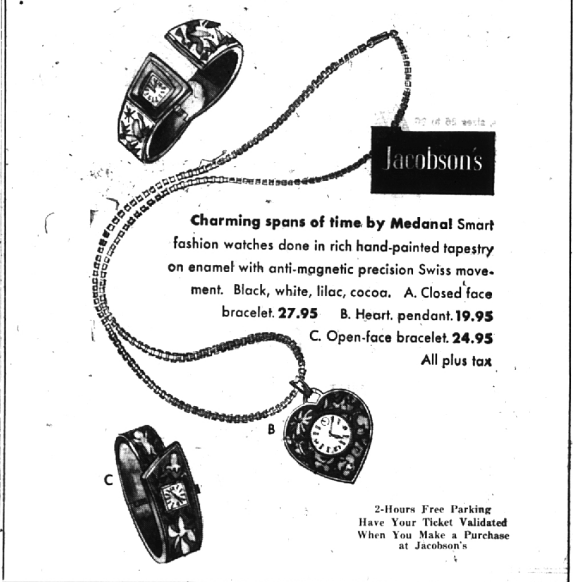
