Try-outs were held two weeks ago on Thursday and Friday, after school, and approximately 10 to 12 acts were selected.

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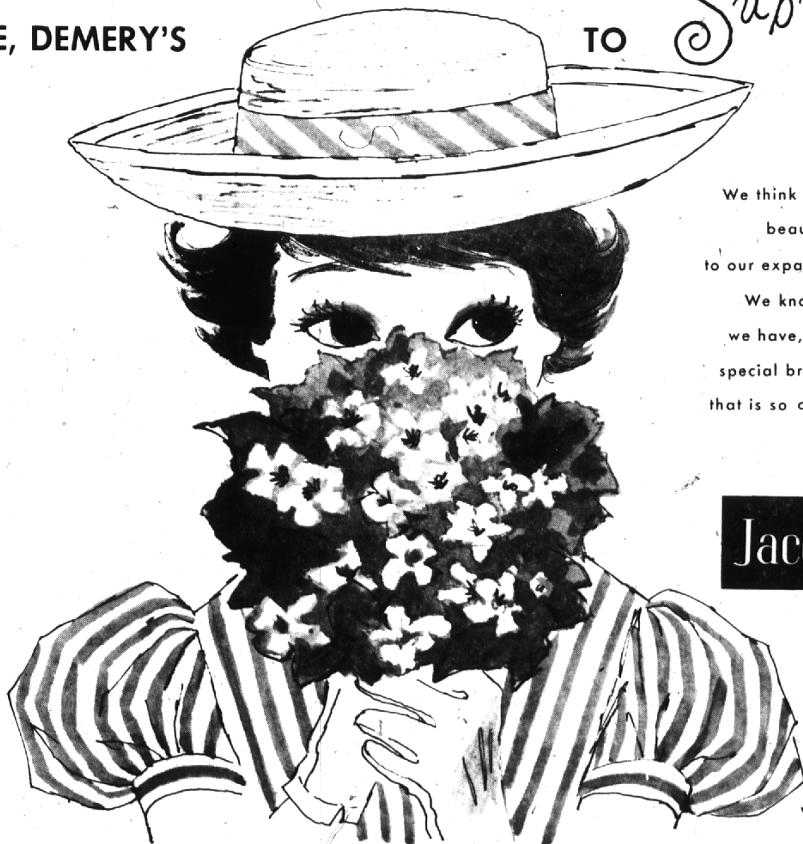
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
