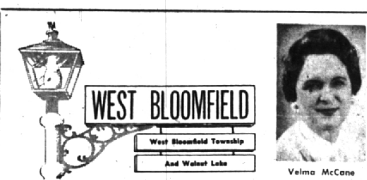
Dickey Addresses PTA Meeting
