Kidd Wins Cranbrook Competition

Robert Kidd, of Cincinnati, O., is the winner of a competition among students of Cranbrook Academy of Art for design of a stained glass window in new St. Stephen's Episcopal Church in Birmingham.

The competition was sponsored by the Willey Sign Co., of Mount Clemens.

Kidd, a candidate for a master of fine arts degree in design, placed first in the judging followed by Lawrence Cindrich, of Pittsburgh, also a candidate for a master of fine arts degree in design, and Charles March, of E. Liverpool, O., a candidate for a MFA degree in metalsmithing. Each student was presented a cash award.

THEME OF THE competition was "The Martyrdom of St. Stephen." The window, which will be installed as the main window in the front of the church, is unique in that it will be done in a new process utilizing plastics instead of the usual glass.

Representing the church at the presentation ceremonies were members of the building committee: Mr. and Mrs. Luel Simmons, Mrs. William Heaton, Roger Blackwood, Carl Zuber, Dayton Slater, Donald Mills, and the Rev. Carl Sayers, vicar of St. Stephen's.

St. Stephen's Church, a mission of Christ Church Cranbrook was dedicated last March 28. The window is expected to be installed about July 1.

Appoint Maxwell Chairman of UNCF

Earl A. Maxwell, 5605 Laber, Birmingham, has been appointed Pontiac area chairman of the 1961 United Negro College Fund campaign.

Maxwell, personnel director of the GMC Truck and Coach Division of the General Motors Corporation in Pontiac, will supervise the solicitation of funds in the Pontiac area.

The campaign is scheduled to get underway May 1 as part of a nationwide appeal to Americans to share in the financial support of 32 colleges and universities located in the South.

LAST YEAR Michigan residents' contributions exceeded the state goal of \$200,000. In accepting the appointment to coordinate the Pontiac area fund campaign, Maxwell stressed the need for cooperation from the entire community.

"Each year these 32 colleges appeal to thoughtful Americans through UNCF," Maxwell said. "Businesses large and small, churches, fraternal groups, clubs and individuals all lend a hand. In order that the vital work of the colleges will continue, it is my hope that those who have contributed before will do so again and that others will join them in the typically American spirit of giving to others," he said.
