### CITY OF BIRMINGHAM ORDINANCE NO. 569

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE SCHEDULE OF REGULATIONS OF ORDINANCE NO. 527 BY ADDITION OF A SECTION TO BE KNOWN AS 3.1-2 TO DETERMINE ZONING DISTRICTS IN WHICH SEMI-PRIVATE SWIMMING POOLS AND PUBLIC SWIMMING POOLS MAY BE PERMITTED.

The City of Birmingham Ordains:

Section 1. That Section 3.1 of Article 3 of Ordinance No. 527 be amended by addition of a section to be known as Section 3.1-2, said section to read as follows:

#### Section 3.1-2 PERMITTED PRINCIPAL USES

A. The "Permitted Principal Uses" allowed on the Schedule of Regulations in Zone District Public Property shall read as follows:

1. Buildings housing governmental functions of the City, County or State.
2. Schools, municipal buildings, libraries, fire stations, police stations, department of public works buildings and storage yards, wells, cemeteries, off-street parking facilities, water towers, auditoriums and essential services.
3. Parks, playground, playfield, stadiums, flood plains, lakes and rivers.
4. Any use of a building or land similar in character to those specified above.
5. Public Swimming Pool.

B. The "Permitted Principal Uses" allowed on the Schedule of Regulations in Zone District "R-3 Multiple Family Residential" shall read as follows:

1. Any permitted principal use in R-4 Zone District subject to the minimum regulations of R-4 Zone District.
2. Multiple family dwellings. (See Article 2)
3. Semi-Private Swimming Pool

C. The "Permitted Principal Uses" allowed on the Schedule of Regulations in Zone District "B-1 Non-Retail Business" shall read as follows:

1. Any permitted principal use in P Zone District subject to the minimum regulations of P Zone District, provided that there shall be no residential occupancy of permitted business buildings.
2. Business uses which do not entail the sale, lease, processing, storing or servicing of personal property. Examples of permitted offices, occupations and professions are: Advertising, architectural, printing, building, chamber of commerce, child care and guidance, chiropractic, contracting, credit bureau, designing, employment agency, engineering, foundation, insurance, investment, landscape architect, legal, manufacturer's representative, medical, planning consultant, reading room, real estate, secretarial and any similar uses.

3. Clubs, social, recreational and community center buildings, excepting those the chief activity of which is a service customarily carried on as a business such as a public dance hall or public bowling alley.
4. Semi-Private Swimming Pool and Public Swimming Pool.

D. The "Permitted Principal Uses" allowed on the Schedule of Regulations in Zone District "B-2 Neighborhood Business Zone District" shall read as follows:

1. Hotels and motels. (See Article 2)
2. Publicly-owned buildings, public utility buildings, telephone exchange buildings, electric transformer stations and sub-stations and gas regulator stations with service yards but without storage yards. (See Article 10)
3. Business uses such as: Offices, grocery stores, tailors, banks, bakeries, drug stores, barber shops, dry dyeing and cleaning establishments, delicatessen, paint, hardware, furniture, clothing and department stores, greenhouses, flower and gift shops, funeral homes, bus passenger station, showroom or workshop of an electrician or plumber, office of a veterinarian provided the animals or birds are kept entirely within the principal building, newspaper and commercial printing establishments, business schools and other similar uses.

4. Municipal uses and buildings housing governmental functions, post offices, clubs, community center buildings, churches and elementary institutions.
5. Places serving food and drink provided such retail activities are transacted within the principal building.

6. Off-street parking, off-street loading or storing facilities of self-propelled motor vehicles subject to the regulations of Article 6. Such off-street parking facilities may have a shelter building for attendant or attendants provided such building is no larger than fifty (50) square feet in area and no higher than eight (8) feet.

7. The uses permitted herein shall be conducted without the outside display or sale of products or the outside storage of goods, material or equipment, except as otherwise provided in this Ordinance.
8. Semi-Private Swimming Pool and Public Swimming Pool.

E. The "Permitted Principal Uses" allowed on the Schedule of Regulations in Zone District "I Industrial" shall read as follows:

1. Business and industrial uses such as: contractor's office and storage yards, building materials building and storage yards, wholesale storage, warehouse, freezer and food locker establishments, wholesale distributing, manufacture of electrical equipment, tools and fixtures, automotive conversion, lumber millwork, injection molding processes, design and manufacture of small automation equipment conversion of strip steel into finished products and any similar uses. (See Section 7.3 for prohibited uses.)
2. Off-street parking, off-street loading and storing facilities of self-propelled vehicles subject to the regulations of Article 6.
3. Publicly-owned buildings, public utility buildings, telephone exchange buildings, electric transformer stations and sub-stations and gas regulator stations. (See Article 10)
4. The outside storage of goods, material or equipment provided such uses conform to the regulation of Section 5.10.
5. Municipal uses and buildings housing governmental functions.
6. Semi-Private Swimming Pool and Public Swimming Pool.

Section 2. The Schedule of Regulations attached to and a part of Ordinance No. 527 shall be deemed modified to incorporate this change.

Ordained by the Commission of the City of Birmingham this 17th day of April, 1961, to be effective upon publication.
