**NOTICE OF SPECIAL ELECTION
VILLAGE OF BINGHAM FARMS**

TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF THE VILLAGE OF BINGHAM FARMS:

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that at a Special Election to be held in the Village of Bingham Farms on August 21, 1961, between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m., the following separate propositions shall be submitted to vote of the qualified electors of said Village:

PROPOSAL NO. 1

Shall Section 3, Chapter XI, of the Village Charter be amended to provide as follows:

Section 3. The cost of all construction, improvement and maintenance of highways, streets and alleys within the Village shall be paid for in accordance with the general laws of the State governing the construction, improvement and maintenance of highways, streets and alleys, within a village. In addition, the Council may determine that the whole, or any part, of the cost of the construction or improvement of highways, streets and alleys within the Village shall be defrayed by special assessment upon the property especially benefited. The Council shall by general ordinance prescribe a complete special assessment procedure.

PROPOSAL NUMBER 2

Shall Chapter IX of the Village Charter be amended by adding a new Section 11 thereto, said new Section 11 to provide as follows:

Section 11. The Council, subject to the applicable provisions of law, may authorize the borrowing of money in anticipation of the payment of special assessments made for the purpose of the construction or improvement of highways, streets and alleys, within the Village. Such special assessment bonds shall be both an obligation of the special assessment district and a general obligation of the Village. All collections on each special assessment roll, to the extent that the same are pledged for the payment of the principal of, and interest on, bonds issued in anticipation of the payment thereof, shall be set apart in a separate fund for the payment of such principal and interest and shall be used for no other purpose.

Section 3, Chapter XI, of the Village Charter now reads as follows:

Section 3. The cost of all construction, improvement and maintenance of highways, streets and alleys within the Village shall be paid from funds received from the state for that purpose. No part of the construction or improvement of highways, streets and alleys which cannot be paid for wholly by state funds shall be authorized or undertaken unless first approved by two-thirds (2/3) of the electors voting at a general election.

Section 3. The cost of all construction, improvement and maintenance of highways, streets and alleys within the Village shall be paid for in accordance with the general laws of the State governing the construction or improvement of highways, streets and alleys within a village. In addition, the Council may determine that the whole, or any part, of the cost of the construction or improvement of highways, streets and alleys within the Village shall be defrayed by special assessment upon the property especially benefited. The Council shall by general ordinance prescribe a complete special assessment procedure.

Section 11. The Council, subject to the applicable provisions of law, may authorize the borrowing of money in anticipation of the payment of special assessments made for the purpose of the construction or improvement of highways, streets and alleys within the Village. Such special assessment bonds shall be both an obligation of the special assessment district and a general obligation of the Village. All collections on each special assessment roll, to the extent that the same are pledged for the payment of the principal of, and interest on, bonds issued in anticipation of the payment thereof, shall be set apart in a separate fund for the payment of such principal and interest and shall be used for no other purpose.

All qualified electors of the Village of Bingham Farms shall be entitled to vote on said Charter amendment propositions.
