A. Correct watering of lawns—one inch of water once every 5 to 7 days.
B. Lace bugs and mites really go after the sap (not you) in rhododendron, azaleas, plane trees, elms and other ornamentals. Use McClellan-Ball INSECT SPRAY or ISOTOX and BE SURE TO SPRAY THE UNDERSIDE OF THE LEAVES.
C. MITES are busy on spruce, cyclamen and many vegetables, perennials and a few deciduous trees. Spray with MALATHION or ARAMITE.
D. MILDEW hits many plants in this warm humid period: lilacs, phlox, many perennials and smooth leaved annuals. Use SULPHUR when temperatures are below 80°, CAPTAN or PHALANT above 80°—and above 90° forget it and head for the brew—the lake.
E. RUONYMUS SCALE needs a spray of ISOTOX twice—once later this month and another early in September.
F. SOFT BROWN SCALE—Don't forget the second or third spray on all ornamentals showing these brown "lady-bug"-sized scales on the underside of the branches.

- This has nothing to do with the rise in gasoline prices—BUT—if you haven't noticed, we have been forced to increase the price of GRANULATED SALT. It is now \$2.30 per hundred pounds.
- THE BROWN PATCHES in your lawn are (probably) due to a fungus disease of one kind or another. Since it is exceedingly difficult to identify the particular disease even when looking at it in the lawn—and practically impossible when hearing about it over the phone, the manufacturers of controls for these diseases categorize their materials as BROAD SPECTRUM FUNGICIDES. In your language and ours this means a "SHOT GUN" material.
If the brownning areas are spreading, get busy and spray the dead and surrounding areas with ACTIDIONE, P-Z. If they are not spreading, spray only the dead areas and later this month refurbish them by scarifying, seeding and watering.

Police Arrest Four Youths In Stolen Car

A 100-mile-an-hour auto chase by Birmingham and Pontiac police early Sunday morning resulted in the arrest of four youths and recovery of a stolen car.
The wild chase ended when the fleeing vehicle, which raced through red lights and narrowly missed other autos, hit a parked car and crashed into a line of parking meters in Pontiac.
Arrested were the driver of the car, Gary W. Potts, 17, of Detroit; Richard D. Evans, 17, of Highland Park; and two juveniles.

Potts and Evans are being held by Highland Park Police and the juveniles have been released to the custody of their parents.
Potts admitted stealing the black 1960 Chevrolet from a parking lot near Sears and Roebuck in Highland Park about 6 p.m. Saturday, according to Birmingham police.
Officers Probst and Gilchrist noticed the car attempting to race another auto from a traffic light at Woodward and 14 Mile about 1:30 a.m. Sunday.

THE OFFICERS pursued the car north on Woodward and alerted Pontiac Police. The chase continued up Woodward through Birmingham, Bloomfield Hills, and onto S. Saginaw Street in Pontiac. The Birmingham patrolmen said Potts reached speeds between 80 and 100 miles per hour.
After nearly hitting a Pontiac police car at Saginaw and Rapid Streets, Pontiac patrolman David L. Schroeder fired a shot into the rear-panel of the car weaving in and out of traffic.
With both Birmingham and Pontiac police giving chase, the fleeing car raced down Parke Street, struck a parked car and veered into the parking meters.

ACCORDING to Birmingham police, the juveniles in the car did not know it was stolen until Potts attempted to escape the Birmingham policemen.

Girl Pulls Man From Walled Lake, Gives Respiration

WEST BLOOMFIELD — A 20-year-old girl lifeguard saved the life of a father of three children Tuesday by pulling him from Walled Lake and applying mouth-to-mouth respiration for 15 minutes.
Lynn Duncan, 5568 Stanford, West Bloomfield Township, found Nello Mantini, 40, of 17776 Omira, Detroit, floating face-down in the water.
MANTINI WAS at a picnic with his wife and three daughters when he fell off a dock. He was taken to Pontiac General Hospital for observation, after Miss Duncan revived him.
Miss Duncan, a sophomore at Alma College, got her job at the beach after taking a Red Cross lifeguard course at a camp near Muskegon in June. She has been employed by the beach since then.

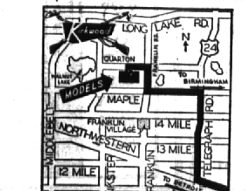
