Travelers Aid Extends Service

Services of the Travelers Aid Society, a Torch Drive agency serving people whose problems are caused by, or intensified by, travel, extended its services last week to the Metropolitan Airport.

For years a fixture in Detroit railroad stations and bus terminals, the Travelers Aid Lamp in was lighted in the airport lobby. Michael J. O'Brien, chairman of the Wayne County Road Commission; Mrs. George Pierrot, vice-president of the Board of the Travelers Aid Society; and William Humphrey Jones, United Foundation director for Western Wayne County, took part in the brief lamp-lighting ceremony.

Forty-two of the 20,708 persons helped last year by the Detroit Travelers Aid were residents of Birmingham, Bloomfield Hills and Franklin.

MRS. AGNES JACKSON, director of Detroit Travelers Aid, said the TA desk on the first floor of Metropolitan Airport, is open from 1 to 9 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday. Travelers Aid services are also available in the Greyhound Bus Terminal and the New York Central Station in Detroit.

A nationwide home town study by Travelers Aid societies showed that 1,806 persons helped between June 16 and June 30 by the Detroit Society came from 44 different states, from seven Canadian provinces, from Puerto Rico and 30 foreign countries.

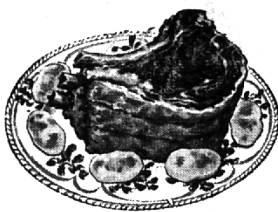

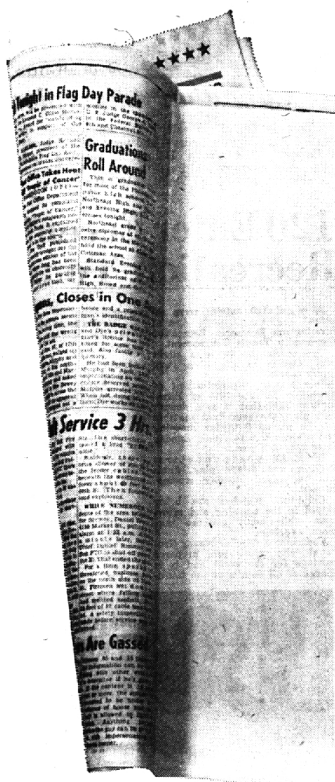
