Traffic Up 37 Per Cent

Traffic increased more than 37 per cent on the Detroit-Chicago Freeway (Interstate 94) during the first six months of 1961, the State Highway Department reports.

At the same time, traffic increased nearly 39 per cent on portions of the Detroit-Muskegon Freeway (Interstate 96) that are open to traffic.

State Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie, in a monthly report to Gov. John B. Swainson said Michigan's freeways are continuing to attract new traffic.

"THIS TREND will continue as more lots of freeways are opened to traffic," Mackie said.

"A large percentage of the increase in traffic is due to diversions from parallel routes in Michigan as well as from the Ohio and Indiana toll roads."

Mackie's report to Gov. Swainson said traffic on all Michigan highways has increased 1.7 per cent during the first six months of 1961, compared to the same period last year.

"THE LARGEST non-freeway increase was on state highways in northeastern lower Michigan where traffic increased 6.4 per cent," Mackie said.

Upper Peninsula traffic showed a small decrease during the first six months of the year.

Traffic in the western half of the U.P. was down 1.6 per cent while traffic in the eastern half of the U.P. was down three-tenths of one per cent, the same decrease in traffic as recorded during the period at the Mackinac Bridge.
