The Rudy Hansons of Vincennes are back after another happy month at their favorite resort, Aushegun landing on Lake Leelanau.

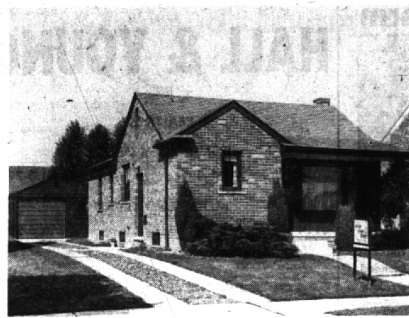
Franklin Branch WNFGA Picks Committee Heads

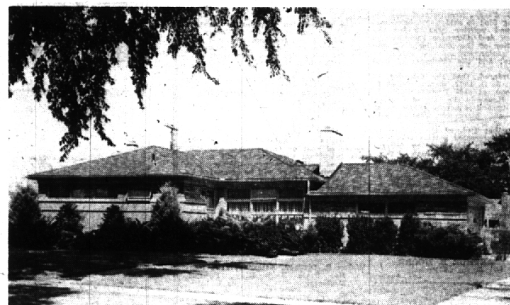

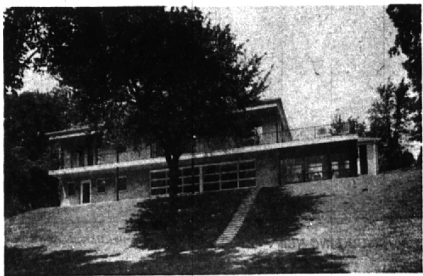
