Resident Participates In Training Seminar

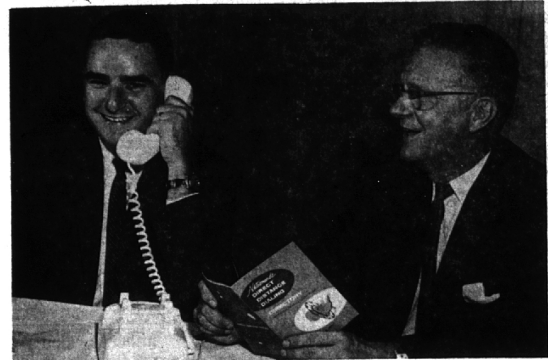
Douglas J. Woulter of Birmingham recently participated in a graduate level seminar at the Goldwater State Home and Training School.

Mayfair Subscribers Get 'Direct Distance Dialing'

"Direct Distance Dialing" for Mayfair exchange subscribers was initiated Friday by State Representative Henry M. Hogan Jr., Bloomfield Township, directly to California at a Michigan Bell Telephone Co. luncheon ceremony commemorating the completion of the \$1,282,000 project.

Attending the event at the Glen Oaks Golf and Country Club were A. H. Warner, manager of the Birmingham office of Michigan Bell, and officials of communities in the Mayfair service area.

"MAYFAIR SUBSCRIBERS have the latest dial equipment in their new central office building," said Warner. "They are now able to dial directly to over 52 million telephones in the United States and Canada."

He suggested that local subscribers refer to the "Direct Distance Dialing" booklet for area codes and methods of dialing distant points. The booklets were recently mailed to subscribers.

Warner traced the growth of the Mayfair exchange from its beginning in January, 1948, as the Long-acre exchange with 2200 subscribers, to the present exchange with 5271 customers.

ON DEC. 3, 1949, he said, it became known as Mayfair. In July, 1950, Mayfair customers were able to dial all the telephones in their home area (S.E. Michigan).
