Birmingham city commissioners dedicated as public property Monday night all but a one-foot strip of a 20-foot wide access alley to the Hunter water tank.

This provision eliminated the objection of some Ridgedale homeowners to the dedication.

Smith, \$20,000 is the estimated contents loss with \$15,000 loss to the building.

Borton Bros. Construction Co. of Detroit, is doing the repair work. A new roof was completed Tuesday.

Last traces of the \$35,000 fire which damaged the building at 277 Pierce, Birmingham, are fast disappearing.

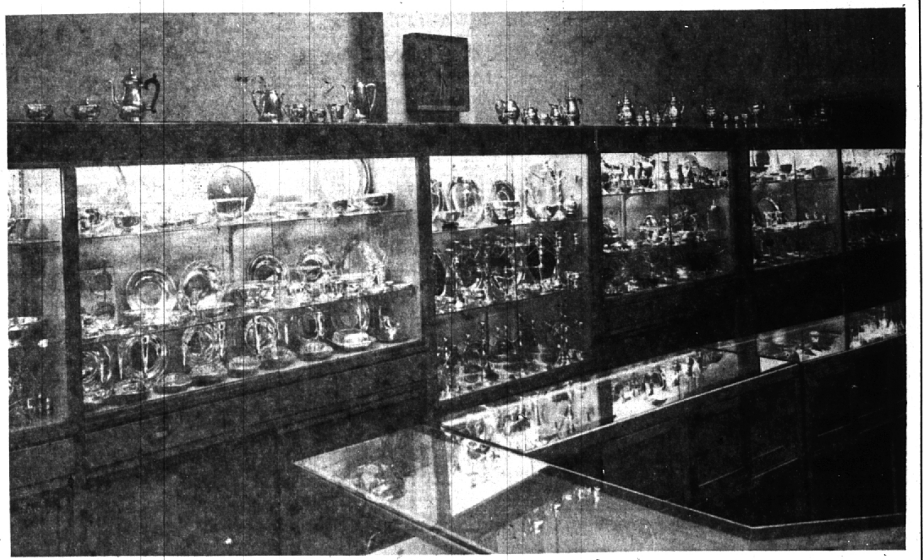
The fire which occurred August 18, caused extensive damage to The Varsity Shop and McSweeney's Fine Footwear.
