Oak'd Has Highest MEA Membership

Membership in Region 7 (Oakland County) of the Michigan Education Association has reached 5,704 as of June 30, 1961, according to the MEA membership division. This represents an increase of 364 over the June 1960 total of 5,340.

Of the 20 MEA districts in Region 7, Oakland County District recorded the highest MEA membership total of 762.

Region 7 membership in the National Education Association also has increased. At the close of the fiscal year, 2,205 educators in the region belonged to the NEA. This is a gain of 200 over the 1960 total.

STATE-WIDE membership in the MEA, the nation's fifth largest educational association, has reached a record high of 68,782, as of June 30, 1961, included in the MEA enrollment total are 62,691 active and life members, 1,908 affiliate members, 1,068 student members, and 2,315 annuitant members. The 1961 MEA membership total shows a gain of 3,822 over the 1960 total of 64,960.

Michigan membership in the NEA also has reached its peak. On June 30, 1961, some 22,937 teachers and administrators belonged to the national association. This figure represents an increase of 2,385 over the 1960 figure of 20,552.
