

Agencies Will Offer Advice at State Fair

Wondering how the new Social Security regulations affect you? Wondering what steps you have to take to enlist in any one branch of the armed services? Do you have any personal problems that can be solved by some of the public services offered by our local, state and federal governments?

Then the place for you to go is the 112th annual Michigan State Fair during the 10-day run which starts Friday, Sept. 1 and continues through Sept. 10.

YOU CAN SAVE much time and effort because over a hundred agencies will be on the grounds to give free advice and literature, according to State Fair General Manager Walter A. Goodman.

The United States Social Security Administration will hand out literature describing the types of benefits available and explaining the new regulations which went into effect a few weeks ago. They provide that a man may put in a

claim at the age of 62 with reduced benefits.

The Secretary of State's exhibit will explain details of the "12 point" law and include displays of the Mackinac Bridge Authority, the Michigan Tourist Council and others.

THE RECRUITING offices of the Army, Navy, Marine, Air Force Reserve, Civil Air Patrol and others will be on hand to tell young men and women why they should sign up now—especially in view of President Kennedy's plans for a military build-up.

The Michigan Employment Security Commission is bringing in its vocational testing devices and conduct tests. However, no employment references will be made on the grounds. The State Employees Association also will present information on jobs.

Other organizations include the Michigan State Police, with their prize-winning land cruiser, the Detroit Fire and Police departments, Greater Detroit Safety Council, Adult Education Association, and the American and Michigan Cancer Foundation.

State Police Plan Auction

Local bargain hunters will have an opportunity to purchase their own for a good buy at the annual State Police auction today. The sale will be held at the East Lansing headquarters.

About two thousand items to be disposed of in 600 lots, ranging from jewelry to hardware by almost an endless variety in between, will be sold to the highest bidder. New, slightly used and old articles will be offered, and several hundred buyers are expected to take advantage of the opportunity to obtain the merchandise at bargain rates.

IN ADDITION to articles stolen, confiscated or found in all parts of the state and whose owners could not be identified, the auction includes articles left at state parks and the personal belongings of persons who have died in state institutions without leaving heirs.

Among the items are bicycles, cameras, car and other types of radios, tires, tools, fishing rods and tackle, rifles and shotguns, 2,000 lbs. of 18 gauge rolled sheet steel, clothing, a diamond ring and even a baby carriage.

Proceeds of the sale after deducting the advertising cost and auctioneer's fee will be turned over to the state treasury.
