Attorney Reports On Storm Water Sewer Program

LATHRUP — City Attorney Everett Hayes, at Monday's council meeting, said he hopes to have preliminary steps necessary to begin the city's storm water and sewer program—ready to roll if approved by voters.

Storm water plans have been submitted to the State Health department, Hayes said, and he is working on the bond application. Removal of a restraining order and temporary injunction in the suit have freed the city to advertise for bids on storm sewer contracts. Hayes said, and he is working on the bond application.

HAYES NOTED that area contractors would be concentrating on bids for bigger jobs in the Detroit vicinity in the near future. Hayes cited the 12-Town Drain project as an example. Prices might therefore be higher than anticipated on the Lathrup project, Hayes said, unless the city is in a position to take so soon.

Such a situation might also mean a cut back on Lathrup's storm water program, Mayor Richard N. Cogger said, if bids are higher than the \$525,000 bond issue already approved by voters.

THE BILL of complaint in the Kelley suit, which charged palpable fraud on the part of the city, has not been dismissed. Only the restraining order and temporary injunction were eliminated as a result of a July 20 hearing before Circuit Judge H. Russel Holland.

SOUTHFIELD — Burglaries in four homes were reported in Southfield Tuesday night.

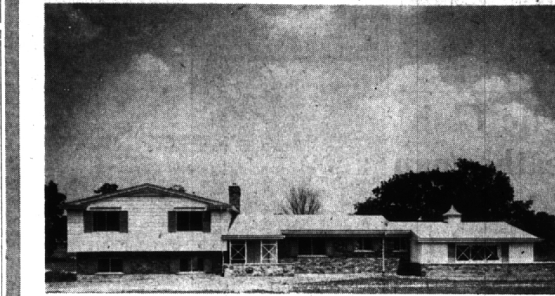
All the thefts occurred sometime between 5 and 10 p.m., according to police.

Money and securities totaling \$200 were taken from the home of Abe Neisholtz, 21445 Brickston. The door to the Neisholtz den was pried open, police said.



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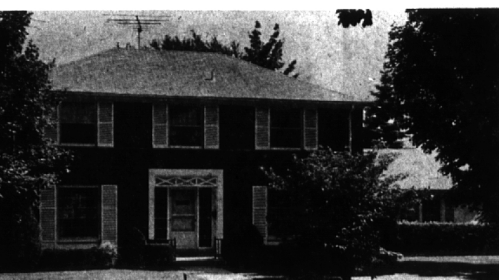
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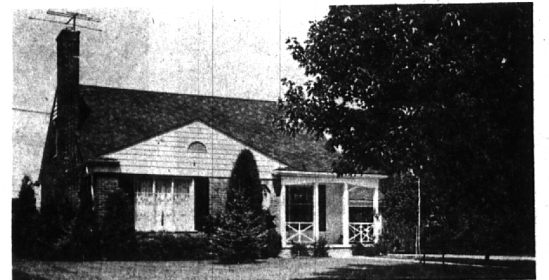
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
