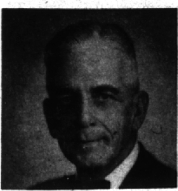

 lodge's early meetings, a frame building "done in ancient form and usage" was purchased for \$1,150 and dedicated Dec. 23, 1873. This first real home of the lodge was located in the vicinity of Shain's Drug Store at Maple and Pierce.

IN THE WORDS of former Michigan Grand Master McCurdy, "The lodge room is large and comfortable, well furnished and tasty, all that heart can wish for—and it is free from debt."

Five weeks later on Jan. 29, 1874, Royal Arch Chapter No. 93 formed and "rented the hall, wood and oil" for \$30 a year.

The new hall remained the Blue Lodge's home for 50 years until the quarters proved so small and the J. Bert Peabody home was purchased March 8, 1923.

Now, almost 40 years later, the lodge's first self-designed Temple is in the making.

 tickets. You just don't hand out \$10,000 in tickets without any kind of security at all.

"Knowing they couldn't get the money from Tackett, who left town, they tried to get it from me. They made it appear as if I sold \$10,000 of their tickets and that I could not pay for them. That's not true."

"The result of this was that KLM notified the IATA, which notified member airlines, and they all pulled my ticket stock. Now I have no credit at all and my reputation is shot."

KLM's DISTRICT manager in Detroit is Hank Van Lunenburg. He said that the airlines has a document signed by the manager of Thrun's agency, Travel Centre of Plymouth.

"Travel Centre said they cancelled the whole thing. They didn't," said the Dutch official.

"It was on the agent's understanding that we issued tickets to the Bloomfield Hills students. I think the whole situation is

very unfortunate. I regret very much that this should happen.

"This Tackett was a personable fellow. No one would have ever thought he would do such a thing. He's high and dry in Arizona—seems no one is going to do anything about him."

NEITHER 'KLM' nor agent Thrun want to ask for a warrant against Tackett because then they would be committing themselves. Van Lunenburg told Thrun to ask for the warrant because Tackett owes him the money and he owes the airlines.

Conversely, Thrun says KLM should ask for the warrant because Tackett is the one who owes them the money.

And according to almost everyone concerned, Tackett is ever-on a used car lot in Phoenix.

THRUN FILED his suit, Civil Action No. 21543 in the U. S. District Court, Eastern District of Michigan, Southern Division, at 2:33 p.m., Aug. 14.

The gist of the suit is that on or about July 27, KLM published a report, which it sent to IATA, advising that the plaintiff (Thrun) failed to pay \$10,000. IATA told

other members of the supposed default and the other members (airlines) withdrew authorization for Thrun to issue tickets.

According to the suit, the report was "false and untrue" and the claim was made with "malicious intent to injure the plaintiff."

ATTORNEYS FOR the plaintiff are Arthur Lumley of Detroit and William Sempliner of Plymouth. Lumley said KLM gave their own tickets. "Our client issued no orders for tickets."

Attorneys for KLM are Edmund M. Brady and George F. Mahling of Detroit.

Mahling said that they just received the case last week and that "we're working on it now. We have to be in court 20 days after the summons was served. So the case should come up sometime in early September."

"We're here to represent our client to the fullest, according to law and the facts of the case," he said.

IN THE meanwhile, 19 Bloomfield Hills High School students are preparing for the first day of school. They're not worrying about suits or counter-suits. They paid their money and got their trip.
