Food Service Industry Is Modern Idea

Today's giant food service industry had some curious beginnings, according to lecturers at the University of Michigan Medical Center.

Restaurants, cafeterias and hospital food service are all relatively "new" in the long history of mankind.

The U of M FOOD specialists say the modern restaurant can be traced to medieval times when religious orders, royal and noble households, and colleges started group feeding.

The first skills in mass feeding probably were learned by harassed cooks at these monasteries, castles and colleges.

THE DEVELOPMENT of public eating places was stimulated later by man's desire and ability to travel. First to appear were lodging places—inns and taverns—which catered to itinerant merchants and stagecoach travelers. Because food service in lodging houses and taverns often was poor, the next step was the appearance of the restaurant as a specialized "eating place."

WHAT ABOUT hospitals? The U of M dietitians admit that hospitals seem to have borrowed the food business rather recently. Not too many years ago, they report, relatives and friends were responsible for feeding a patient during his hospital stay.

This practice still persists in some parts of the world today. Occasionally, when a foreign student at the U of M becomes ill, his friends appear at University Hospital ready to feed him. They are amazed to learn that the hospital has a multi-million dollar food service area — with kitchens, bakeries, cafeterias, bed-side serving and trained dietitians.

Research on the lifesaving methods will be held at a water-filled pool near Williamston, Michigan, about five miles east of Lansing.

The organizations point out that, each year, an average of 400 Americans lose their lives when their automobiles plunge off bridges and roads into deep water. Although in the past years, some tests have been made and many theories advanced, the first such intensive research on the most practical methods of escape and rescue.

RESULTS OF THE tests will be made available to the American driving public and also will be distributed internationally through the League of Red Cross Societies.

Dr. Bernard Loft, director of training of the Michigan State Police, will supervise the underwater activities. Richard Brown, director of Water Safety Services for the American National Red Cross, will coordinate the project.

Schedule Classes In Children's Art At Cranbrook

The fall term of children's art classes at the Young People's Art Center, sponsored by the Cranbrook Academy of Art Galleries, will begin the week of Sept. 19.

A new class has been added this year for six and seven-year-olds. No child under six will be accepted.

The fall session will continue for 10 weeks with three classes scheduled on Saturdays and after school on Tuesday's, Wednesday's and Thursday's. The latter will be a high school class, ages 14-19, at 4 p.m.

Each group will meet weekly for an hour and a half, working in a wide variety of media. Classes are specifically designed to stimulate the creativity and imagination of the student.

YPAC instructor is Glen Michaels, Birmingham artist and an alumnus of Eastern Washington College of Education, the Yale School of Music and Cranbrook Academy of Art where he received his MFA degree in painting and ceramics.

Elliott Criticizes Action Of AFL-CIO on Con-Con

Oakland County Republican Chairman Arthur G. Elliott Jr. Tuesday charged the Oakland County AFL-CIO with trying to control the forthcoming Constitutional Convention by controlling the Democratic party.

Elliott claimed that the Oakland AFL-CIO had endorsed the fall slate of Democratic Con-Con candidates without interviewing or giving consideration to Republican nominees.

"The AFL-CIO leadership's action is to be regretted," Elliott said. "It lends credence to the charge that the AFL-CIO is not interested in a comprehensive study of election issues and candidates but merely in controlling the convention by controlling the Democratic party."

ELLIOTT ASSERTED that "it is the proper function of union leadership to make available its membership the positions of both parties."

"This is particularly true in Con-Con, the purposes of which far transcend those of the parties," Elliott said.

THE UNION has turned down an invitation to a similar meeting in Pontiac two weeks ago, said Elliott.

Toys collected will be distributed to needy children at Christmas by the marines and other organizations.
