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Broomfield Speaks on Foreign Aid

Congressman William S. Broomfield Monday called for an approach to foreign aid based on "reality and provable fact" rather than on "will-o-the-wisp dreams."

"We lack the basic building blocks on which to form a complete, comprehensive overall program for a country simply because we have been too busy building dams for electric power where there are no residences, roads which go nowhere and plants which produce products which the local population refuses to use," he said.

BROOMFIELD, a member of the House Foreign Affairs Committee and critic of President Kennedy's foreign aid bill, blasted what he termed "the hit-or-miss school of foreign aid."

"U.S. foreign aid has failed to realize its potential effectiveness largely because of the will-o-the-wisp dreams conjured up by people who are far removed from the problems at hand," he said. Arguing for an annual foreign aid appropriation rather than the administration supported multi-year authorization of funds, Broomfield said the Kennedy approach would "result in continued waste, duplication and ineffectiveness."

"WHAT WE NEED is sound, objective, accurate, long-range planning," Broomfield said. "It will cost us far less time, manpower and money than the present hit-or-miss method of operation, which has done the program more harm than good."

Broomfield said the Kennedy bill represents "a paper plan based on speculation rather than on first-hand observation and research."

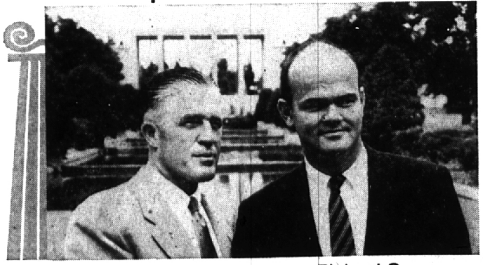
