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NO BETTER TIME to

Bend over the cabbage heads if they begin to crack. This will check their growth and—for some reason—this is good.

Dig potatoes if the tops have died. Perhaps, however, they will be better off in the ground than in the cellar.

Fertilize your lawn for the THIRD time (FOURTH for Merion Bluegrass).

Realize the importance of timing in the lawn maintenance program.

1. Kill all obnoxious growths (except broad-leaved weeds) NOW.
2. Immediately after No 1 fertilize using 2 lbs. of actual nitrogen to 1000 sq. ft., or:—
20 lbs. of 10-6-4 to 5000 sq. ft.
22 lbs. of 20-10-5 to 2500 sq. ft.
60 lbs. of 6-10-4 to 5000 sq. ft.

(Other materials at a rate to provide 2 lbs. of actual nitrogen per 1000 sq. ft.)

3. Two weeks after No. 1 scratch up bare spots, seed, rake in, cover with peat moss, keep moist.
4. About Sept. 15th to 20th kill broadleaved weeds with a 2-4-D product.

Buy and plant MADONNA LILIES.

Acquire all the COLCHICUM BULBS (grown without water, soil, or care) for yourself, friends, shut-ins, et cetera.

Leave a reasonable amount of foliage for the formation of new corns when cutting gladioli spikes (flowers).

Aid the lawn of moles by using:—

1. Poison
2. Mole traps
3. Chlordane to eliminate grubs (the moles food)

Tie up cauliflower heads by pulling the leaves over the heads and fastening with a string or TWIST-EMS.

Firm the soil around brussels sprouts so they will form sprouts instead of making leaf growth.

George Pierrot's World Adventure Series will be expanded at the Birmingham Community House during the coming season, BCH President Thoburn H. Wiant announced today.

Wiant, calling the series "a sparkling success last season," said it will be expanded to 15 Friday nights and 10 Saturday nights, beginning Nov. 3 and 4.

"This season," said Wiant, "in order to better serve the Birmingham-Bloomfield area, the Community House and George Pierrot will offer the series on the two nights and thus double the opportunity for people to enjoy the world's outstanding cameramen narrators."

HE SAID ticket requests will be handled on a first-come-first-served basis. Season tickets for the entire series of 10 color-film programs will cost \$10 each.

Checks or money orders should be drawn in favor of the World Adventure Series and sent to the Community House at 380 South Bates, Friday night, or Saturday night, should be specified. When Pierrot opened his Birmingham branch at the Community House last fall, it was the first time in 27 years that his series had appeared outside of the Detroit Institute of Arts.
