is a one-bedroom unit containing a minimum of 600 square feet, excluding bath and kitchen. In units containing more than one bedroom, each additional room is limited to a minimum of 100 square feet.

LAND ZONING for multiple dwellings may also be used for a single or two-family home or general hospitals.

Hospitals are limited to sites of five or more acres with a minimum of 120 feet frontage on a major thoroughfare. All ingress and egress to the hospital must be from the thoroughfare.

All multiple dwellings must have a 40-foot front set back and a 35-foot rear yard. Minimum side yards are 15 feet, with increased side yards if the building is over 40 feet wide. Buildings are limited to a maximum width of 125 feet. There must be at least 45 feet between buildings.

A Birmingham resident drew praise last week from Oakland Circuit Judge William John Beer for good citizenship.

In a report to the city commission on disposition of four circuit court appeals cases, legal counsel James A. Hewitt said Knight was the sole witness to a case of reckless driving and reported it to Birmingham police while it was taking place.

He informed police via telephone equipment in his car.

Knight followed the man, Erwin H. Mullen of Clarkston, until he was apprehended by Birmingham police.

Judge Beer found Mullen guilty and sentenced him to seven days in the county jail.

IN ANOTHER CASE, Judge Beer held that the City's ban on parking on the shoulder of Fairfax during Sunday morning church hours was a proper exercise of police power.

Harry Stark, Jr., 268 Fairfax, appeared a parking ticket issued when he parked in front of his home during the prohibited hours. He argued that it was improper for the City to regulate parking off of the paved portion of the street.

Judge Beer disagreed, found Stark guilty and fined him \$4 payable to Birmingham, and \$25 costs, payable to the county.

Teachers Plan 3-Day Confab

A three-day orientation program for the professional staff of the Birmingham Public Schools will be held Friday, Wednesday and Thursday.

The program will include an orientation session for new teachers on Friday, followed by a two-day pre-school conference for all teachers on Wednesday and Thursday.

The new staff employed by the board of education for the school year totals 151. New professional members include three administrative personnel, 78 elementary teachers, and 61 secondary teachers.

IN ADDITION, there are nine special service personnel including

speech correctionists, visiting teachers, school nurses, arithmetic and reading consultants, library staff, a diagnostician and professionals in special education.

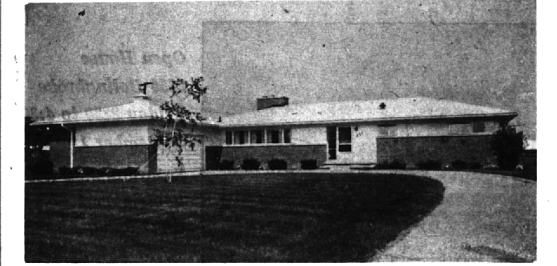

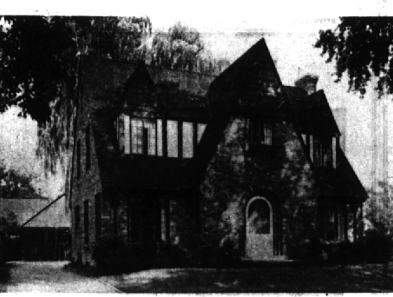
