Series Features Explorer's Film

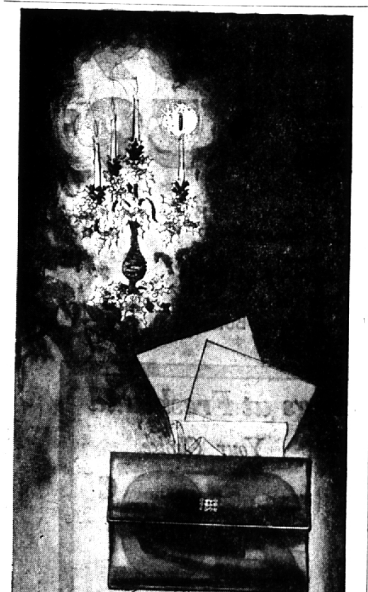

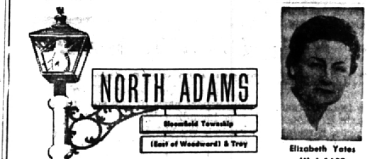
