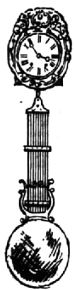

then something happens, some crisis," says Iggy in his broken English.

HE AND HIS SON Cuki pronounced Sucky live on E. Ruffner. The boy, now 18, graduated from Seaborn High School in June of this year and hopes to become a doctor.

With that goal in mind, father and son have started a lawn cutting and snow removal service. They keep house in the little home which Pinter bought three years ago and even turn out Hungarian goulash and chicken paprikash (fried chicken coated with paprika). "I do most of the cooking, but it is not so good," Iggy says with a wry smile.

HE AND CUKI dodged in and out of doorways while guns rattled and finally left Budapest behind them. A bottle of vodka won them a ride on a train to the Austrian border and "pop" there showed us the safe way to get across to the west.

Their escape was managed in 24 hours. Three weeks later they were on a plane, headed for Camp Kilmor.

"They helped me fast because of the boy," Iggy says. At Camp Kilmor, he found more helping hands, those of the Rev. Emil Kontz and his wife, who were serving as chaplains for the Hungarian Refugee Council. Rev. Kontz, then minister of Birmingham's First Baptist Church, had been released by the local church to work for two months at the camp.

IGGY WAS located soon after in Birmingham and, again through Rev. Kontz, who contacted Averill, found employment in The Eccentric backshop.

Among his new friends and his fellow-workers, Iggy learned his present trade and the English language. In his quiet way, he goes about his duties and continues the long fight to get his wife back. Meanwhile, with shoe leather and persistence, he tries to help his friend and through him, others in his native land.

And tomorrow, he will take his first papers, his passport to citizenship. No doubt he will think of many things: his wife, his son, his friends—and even a picture of the President.
