

Franklin Sees Need For Sewer System

FRANKLIN—"The sands of time are running out on the 'Town that Time Forgot'." Paul Robertson, chairman of the sanitation and health committees reported to the council Monday night.

"We have to act very soon, or be designed out of the Evergreen Interceptor. Operating our own sewage treatment plant would be prohibitive."

Admittedly unable to make a detailed report of every problem in the village, Robertson's committee did nevertheless study the overall situation for 10 months and concluded that about 50 per cent of the property owners have now, or have had some septic trouble. In some cases, high water tables and heavy soil conditions make use of land impossible.

"MANY OF THESE problems remain unsolved or are temporarily transferred by running effluent into a roadside ditch or stream," the report states.

For a permanent solution, Robertson and his committee recommended the council place the twice-defeated matter on the ballot again in March. The cost of installations could be defrayed by a combination of ad-

valorem tax and tap-in fees, he suggests.

The report urges Franklin to join the Evergreen Sewer project immediately while it is possible to connect in with the proposed Southfield City lines and negotiate with the Oakland county DPW to build the mains and the laterals to all existing lots in the village.

THE COUNCIL and committee will meet in closed session tonight and the matter would again be discussed next Monday night when the council re-convenes to complete the month's agenda.

Each rider completed one round in the morning and one in the afternoon over a course which included 14 fences. Judging was based on SEI rules (time as well as faults in jumping).

On the winning A squad were Bob Sample on High Society, Barbara Robinson riding Sky High, Sue Wallace on Sad Sack and Sue Sauer on Pandora.

Toledo Sparks took first in the B class, with Wallace's Wee Notchers in second, the Grossa Pointe Cubs third and the BOH Defenders fourth. Members of the defenders were Lynn Masdel (Miss MacNeil), Debbie Willson (Unexpected), Maureen Morval (Bruderschaff), and Penny Crocker (Penny's Promise).

The 15 riders who had the cleanest rounds (no faults) qualified for the individual low score jumpoff. Winners were judged on speed only.

Second to Sample in the A class was BOH's Pete Foley, winner of the B race was Cheryl Davis of Toledo on My Lassie, followed by Maureen Morval of Bloomfield on Bruderschaff.

SECOND PLACE in the event went to the BOH Top Rails. Team members were Pete Foley (Jung and Leviton), Bob Lambere (Secret Formula) and Larry Gierke (Smooth Sailing).

The Toledo jets took third and the Grant Thunderbirds of Birmingham finished in fourth place.
