## 1,100 Korean Vets Utilize VA Farm Training Program

Over 1,100 Korean veterans have taken the farm training program in Michigan, said R. M. Fitzgerald, manager, Detroit Regional Office, Veterans Administration. Although the farm training program is nearing completion, 25 Korean veterans are still taking farm training. This program is a combination of class work and individual instruction. The farm instruction is given by the same instructor who teaches the same instruction on the farm of each veteran and is made specifically to apply to the improvement of that farm. Farms cannot be approved for training unless they can be developed into economic units which will support the farm family.

THE DEPARTMENT of Vocational Agriculture, headed by Harry Nesman in the Department of Public Instruction, determines whether farms are adequate for training purposes under Public Law 552. Farms used for training disabled veterans are approved by the VA training officer. Institutional on-the-farm training is now available in Michigan only at Homer, Big Rapids, Mesick, Vassar and Yale. Many Michigan schools once offered farm training in cooperation with the VA. In addition, several disabled veterans are being trained on their own farms to improve their farming operations by instructors selected by the VA. All of this instruction is practical application to the particular farm and is given on that farm. Most of these instructors were formerly employed by public schools to conduct veteran classes

## Remember to Move Fast On Suffocation Accidents

When for any reason a person fails to get air into his lungs he is suffocating. This form of accident occurs quite commonly in a variety of ways, and anyone who pretends to know the essential things about first aid should know how to treat suffocation.

Work fast. The body has no reserve supply of oxygen and when breathing stops for any reason there is usually enough oxygen in the lungs and blood to sustain life for only three to five minutes. If the heart and brain are deprived

of oxygen for much longer than that they may be injured beyond repair. Whatever the cause of the suffocation—electric shock, choking on a foreign object, near drowning, inhalation of poison gases, or others—the treatment is the same. It is to get air into the lungs and restore normal breathing. If there is a foreign body like a large chunk of meat stuck in the back of the throat, this, of course, must first be removed either with the finger or by putting the head

down and striking the patient on the back.

The means of doing this is mouth-to-mouth breathing. This is done by breathing directly from your lungs into the lungs of the victim, making sure that the passage from his mouth to his lungs is kept open. You can see his chest rise and fall if he is getting the air from your lungs. The method is almost instinctive and has been recognized as the best form of artificial respiration.

Tilt the victim's head back, with him lying on his back, hold his head in position with one hand and pull the jaw forward with the other. Then make a seal with your mouth on the victim's and breathe into his mouth about 20 times a minute, the normal breathing rate. Take your mouth away from his

after each breath and fill your own lungs with clear air again. Red Cross manuals and teaching films give detailed instructions in this method, and it would be well for everyone to know how it is done. It could mean saving the life of a loved one some time.

Keep up the artificial respiration until a doctor or a fireman with a resuscitation machine arrives. Send for help immediately when the accident occurs. Then start mouth-to-mouth breathing. Oxygen makes up about 21 percent of the air we breathe and it is vital to life. Remember to move fast when someone has suffocated, and get air into his lungs so that it can be sent through the body in the

blood stream. Don't get excited. Remember what you must do. Then act fast and keep up the mouth-to-mouth breathing until other help arrives.

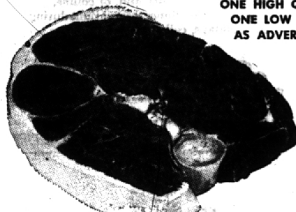
