First Aid Do's and Don'ts On Accidental Poisonings

The young, toddling explorer in your family presents the greatest hazard in poisoning. His ingrained urge to find out about the world leads him into all the nooks and crannies in the house and he will sample anything he finds there. He does not have the caution that every puppy is born with. Curiosity is his driving force.

Experience everywhere shows that the principal enemies of this ever inquisitive youngster are aspirin, kerosene, and furniture or other polishes.

Aspirin, a mere headache remedy to the adult, can produce alarming symptoms in the child either if it is given in repeated doses for a mild infection or is sampled by him several tablets at a time on his own.

This sovereign household remedy, as well as sleeping tablets or other adult medicines, should be kept well out of reach. Besides tables, medicine cabinets and other handy spots for poisons should be kept free of these dangerous substances. The other principal danger spot is that place under the sink where cleaning substances are so often kept. Lye, polishes, and the "pop" bottle filled with kerosene are especially to be feared. They also must be kept out of reach.

Young imbibers may be detected by stains about the mouth or such symptoms as vomiting and prostration. If poisoning is suspected you must:

1. Call the doctor, but do not waste much time on the phone.
2. Empty the child's stomach—induce vomiting by gagging with your finger placed down his throat.
3. If this is unsuccessful give him a salt solution to drink (one tablespoon of table salt dissolved in a glass of warm water) or warm water and mustard (a teaspoon of dry mustard powder dissolved in a glass of warm water). Pinch the child's nose to make him swallow. After he has vomited give him some milk to swallow and take him to the nearest doctor or hospital at once. If vomiting does not occur take him to the hospital immediately.
4. Do not empty the stomach in eye or kerosene poisoning. Do not make the child vomit. Call your doctor, or take the child to the hospital at once.
5. Help to identify the poison. Take to the doctor or the hospital the bottle or box in which the poison was contained. This will help provide the information requested by the doctor.

There are now over 400 Poison Information Centers in the United States. Perhaps there is one nearer than can help your doctor help you. Consult your local telephone directory for a list. You will find there alongside of "Police" and "Fire" the number of your local Poison Information Center.

Teacher-to-Teacher Plan. New International Project

Promotion of international understanding among teachers of all nations is the goal of a project recently launched nationwide by the National Department of Classroom Teachers, a department of the National Education Association, in cooperation with the United States Information Agency.

Hundreds of Michigan classroom teachers throughout the state are participating in the project named "Teacher-to-Teacher."

AS PART OF THE U. S. Information Agency's "People-to-People" program, the "Teacher-to-Teacher" project is a united effort to help teachers of other countries obtain supplies, equipment and instructional materials and to foster friendship and good will between this country and others.

THE "TEACHER-TO-TEACHER" project is concerned with five major areas:

Supplies—Through the cooperation of the U. S. Navy, some 1,300 pounds of supplies were recently shipped from Grosse Ile Air Base to 11 Panamanian schools.

Supplies included such items as: chalk, pencils, bicycle repair kits, and a unique chalkboard which can be built from the plywood material of the boxes sent. It is proposed that 1,000 pounds of teaching materials be sent to Northern Rhodesia.

Tape Recording—Foreign language classes in several Michigan schools, notably MacKenzie High School in Detroit and Port Huron High School, are exchanging tape recordings and letters with their counterparts abroad.

French and Spanish classes in Michigan are exchanging tape recordings with classes in Mali and Nicaragua, respectively. Kalamazoo and Holland schools are exchanging tapes with South African schools.

Affiliation with Overseas Schools—Several local units of the Michigan Department of Classroom Teachers have affiliated with schools in foreign countries.

Several such schools include: a South American school (Portage, Michigan); a South African school and schools in Ghana and Venezuela (Emerson Junior High School, Flint); 11 Panamanian schools (Region 6, Macomb and St. Clair counties, of the Michigan Education Association); and students at Eastern Michigan University will affiliate with schools to be chosen.

Textbooks—Distribution of textbooks to overseas schools is handled through the U. S. Information Agency.

IN A RECENT address to the National Department of Classroom Teachers, Richard C. Wooton, program executive, U. S. Information Agency, said, "American teachers can play a major role in winning friendship, understanding and respect for our country and the concepts for which it stands."

American Overseas Bases—Many faculty members of overseas dependents schools have little contact with their professional colleagues in the United States.
