**ORDER OF MICHIGAN CONSERVATION COMMISSION REGULATING FISHING IN SPECIAL TROUT PONDS**  
The Conservation Commission, by authority of Act 239 of 1957, as amended, hereby orders that for five years from January first, 1962, it shall be unlawful, except as hereinafter provided, to fish in any Mountain Trout Pond, Section 16, T 4 N, R 11 E, and Section 24, T 4 N, R 11 E, Dairburg Trout Pond, Section 16, T 4 N, R 8 E, and Section 24, T 4 N, R 8 E, and Section 16, T 4 N, R 8 E, and Section 24, T 4 N, R 8 E, Oakland County.

- Fishing shall be lawful during the statutory trout season.
- Fishing shall be limited to the period from one hour before sunrise to one hour after sunset.
- Artificial flies only may be used. For the purpose of this regulation, the term "artificial fly" shall be defined as any form of bait or lure which shall not have attached thereto any type of fishing lure of whatsoever kind or color.
- No boats or rafts shall be placed in or on any pond.
- The daily limit shall be two trout. Approved September twentieth, 1961. (42)

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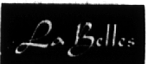
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
