

## Safety Council Checks Methods Of JA Production

More than a score of Michigan safety experts from the Greater Detroit Safety Council, will watch over industrial safety procedures in Junior Achievement companies.

Heading "Operation Caution" is G. E. "Jerry" Montgomery, executive director of the Greater Detroit Safety Council.

ALTHOUGH THE safety record of some of America's smallest corporations is good, Montgomery said, the council has offered the teen business organization a series of inspections and orientation meetings on the latest safety methods.

Pointing out that some twenty-six safety experts are now touring JA's sixteen business centers in southeastern Michigan, Montgomery said the council is playing an important role in the day to day operations of the junior size firms.

SAID THAT over ninety per cent of the 14 companies are manufacturing concerns and rely heavily on the use of machinery to manufacture their own product.

### Be Cautious in Use Of Lie Detectors, Instructor States

Employers should be cautious in using lie detector tests to check up on their employees or hiring new workers, state a University of Michigan man.

Ross J. Wilhelm, instructor in marketing in the U-M School of Business Administration, says companies concerned about employee thefts are using the tests more and more.

BUT TEST RESULTS are not clear and unambiguous, and mistakes in interpretation can have "terrible consequences for an employee" and can be risky for the employer who could face a lawsuit, Wilhelm cautions in a U-M radio station program "Business Review."

The main argument for lie detector tests is that they work and provide an objective measurement in an otherwise difficult judgement situation, he explains. The tests are based on physiological changes in person, such as in breathing, blood pressure or perspiration, when they lie.

LIQUOR STORES, mail order houses, food processors and vending machine operators are among firms which seem to be using the tests the most, Wilhelm says.

## Fire Endangers \$852,000 Property During November

The total amount of property endangered by fire during November was \$852,000, according to a report issued by Fire Chief Park H. Smith.

Forty runs were listed for the month, 24 of them silent alarms for fires and investigations. The remaining 16 runs were for investigation of: suspected gas, 2; first aid, 4; false alarms, 1, and miscellaneous, 9.

ESTIMATED TOTAL loss by

fire was \$100. Total estimated insurance carried on endangered buildings was \$534,400 and on contents \$218,500 for a total of \$752,900 total estimated insurance carried on endangered property.

Actual hours of fire fighting, rescue work and investigations was 13:48. Inspections made during the month took 193 hours. Four hours were spent on inspections where action by the fire prevention bureau was necessary.

FPB INSPECTIONS took a total of 113:10 hours. The hours spent on inspections indicate only actual hours spent outside the department and does not include time spent preparing for this work or the follow-up inspections.

Seventy-three miles were traveled enroute to fires by department cars and trucks.

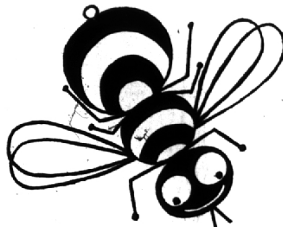
