and sale, consumption, possession and supply of alcoholic beverages to persons under 21 years of age.

It also bans the consumption, possession or transportation of such beverages in motor vehicles as well as in public places within the city.

OTHER PROVISIONS in the proposed ordinance ban the falsifying of age.

Penalties proposed are a maximum fine of \$100 or a maximum 90 days in jail, or both, for those over 17. Violators 17 or under would be turned over to juvenile authorities.

VILLAGE OF BEVERLY HILLS ORDINANCE NO. 51

AN ORDINANCE GOVERNING ROADSIDE DRAINAGE DITCHES, CULVERTS, LATERALS, CATCH BASINS, DRIVEWAYS AND ALL APPLICABLE TYPING, PLACING, RULING AND REGULATIONS FOR THE ISSUANCE OF PERMITS TO CONSTRUCT CULVERTS, DRIVEWAYS AND DRIVEWAY AFFIDAVITS IN THE VILLAGE OF BEVERLY HILLS AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS OF SAID ORDINANCE.

THE VILLAGE OF BEVERLY HILLS ORDAINS:

Section 1.01. It shall be unlawful to proceed with any excavation or construction within the Village limits of the Village of Beverly Hills, or to move any machinery, equipment or materials onto any property preparatory to such excavation or construction until a culvert shall have been installed and covered as hereinafter described, pursuant to permit as hereinafter provided for.

Section 2.01. Application for permit shall be made to the Village Clerk on a form to be provided by the Village, which form shall contain an acknowledgment of the receipt of a copy of this Ordinance, and it shall be unlawful to proceed with any excavation or construction without the permit herein provided for.

Section 3.01. The Village Clerk shall notify the Village Engineers who shall determine the size and location of culvert and shall stake location on the property.

The cost of this Engineering Service shall be twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollars and shall be paid to the Village Clerk by the permit applicant.

A Civil Developer who employs a registered Engineer may provide a Certificate by this registered Engineer certifying that the culvert and culvert in lieu of the twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollar fee, heretofore provided.

Section 4.01. Culvert Specifications:

- A. Sizing:
 1. Culverts shall be of sufficient size to carry the design flow of the available grade.
 2. Culverts shall be minimum of 12 inches in diameter, and a minimum of 18 feet long.
- B. Grade:
 1. Culverts shall be laid on ditch grade.
- C. Material:
 1. 16 gauge corrugated, hot dipped galvanized, copper bearing steel pipe or C75 reinforced concrete pipe shall be used.
 2. All culverts shall be fitted with concrete rings per Michigan State Highway Department Specifications.
 3. Head wall may be substituted for rings, provided they conform with the Michigan State Highway Department Standards for such headwalls.
- D. Joints:
 1. Sections of galvanized pipe shall be connected with bolted #10 grade galvanized standard connecting bands not less than 7/8 inches wide.
 2. Joints in concrete pipe shall be sealed according to the Michigan State Highway Standard Specifications.
- E. Laying:
 1. 6 inches of sand bed must be placed beneath the culvert to insure uniformity of bed.
 2. The culverts shall have no less than a 6 inch cover of 22A gravel, slag or crushed stone.
 3. Rip rap shall be placed in ditch at each end of culvert if required by the Village Engineer. 6 inch stone size shall be used and rip rap shall conform of the flow line of the ditch.

Section 5.01. Driveways:

When driveways are constructed they shall conform with the following specifications:

- A. Driveway shall be constructed to meet road at shoulder edge elevation.
- B. Driveway shall be constructed in such a manner that all water run-off from said driveway shall be diverted into road ditch and at no time shall run into the roadway. This may be done by a flare or other approved means at property line.
- C. Driveways shall not lead into street intersections.

Section 6.01. Ditches:

- A. Ditches shall be constructed to minimum Village Standards at the time culvert is installed.
- B. Ditches shall be kept in good condition and free of obstruction.

Section 7.01. All machinery, equipment and material must have access to or be delivered through means of or via the completed culvert and approach, and in no instance shall machinery, trucks or other equipment be moved through unprotected ditches to gain access to any construction site.

Exception to the above rules and regulations may be made by the Road Commissioner during periods when frozen ground makes it impractical or impossible to install permanent culverts properly. Under such conditions, timber bridges may be installed but only in such manner as to not impair or interfere with the proper drainage or run-off of water in such ditches.

Section 8.01. No machinery, equipment or materials may be stored, stacked or piled on roadway shoulders, ditches or other public property. It is understood that public property includes the area commonly identified as the "Platted right-of-way" as indicated on the registered plat.

Section 9.01. Where culverts, ditches, and road shoulders have not been provided for access to improved property, or where emergency ditches, road shoulders, driveways and driveway approaches have been improperly constructed adjacent to improved property, corrections may be required by the Village Road Commissioner to maintain proper road maintenance and drainage control.

Corrections to comply with this Ordinance shall be done by the Village. The cost of such work shall be borne by the property owner.

Sections 10.01. Any person, firm or corporation convicted of violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be subject to a fine of not exceeding One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars or imprisonment in the County Jail for a period not exceeding 90 days or both, such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court, together with costs of said prosecution. A separate offense shall be deemed committed upon each day during or on, when a violation occurs or continues.

Section 11.01. The provisions of this Ordinance shall be also enforceable through the bringing of appropriate action for injunction, mandamus, or otherwise in any court having jurisdiction. The violation of this Ordinance shall be deemed a nuisance per se. If any one or more provisions of this Ordinance shall be invalid or unenforceable for any reason, the remaining provisions hereof shall nevertheless continue in full force and effect.

Section 13.01. This Ordinance shall be known and may be cited as the "Village of Beverly Hills Road Culvert Ordinance."

Section 14.01. This Ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency Ordinance, which is immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety, and shall become effective immediately upon publication.

Made and passed by the Village Council of the Village of Beverly Hills, this 18th day of December, A.D., 1961.

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
