as the proposed permanent policy of the board, he said.
"WAS THERE" was the title to this policy on the "to" of any of the board members?" one member of the audience inquired.
"This statement is a compromise of divergent views, as no seven could come to a meeting seeing exactly eye to eye," Lee responded. He went on to explain why he wanted to do what all of the citizens want to do. He said that his judgment says it is best. We are particularly sensitive to a need to avoid controversy, but we probably can never make everyone happy."

THE BOARD refused to let the audience the exact number of complaints the district has had from parents objecting to prayers being given in the classrooms.
It was these objections that led to the temporary decision by the board, made by telephone conference among its members, to refer the program prayers to the John Day told the audience that one reason for the decision in the system held daily prayers.

AN ELOQUENT plea not to abrogate the teachers' freedom of religious conscience was made by Nelson St. John.
He read article one of the Bill of Rights to the board.
"If an congress can make no law prohibiting the free exercise of religion, how can this board make one?" he asked.

"By banning verbal prayer as a separation of church and state, would we not have to remove the chaplain from the senate, the words 'In God we trust' from our coins, to help me profit from our courtroom oaths and have the president take his oath of office on a dictionary rather than a Bible?" he asked.

SOME 20 MEN and women from the audience gave their reasons for objecting to the restriction. "You're protecting the minority to the hilt. How about protecting the majority?" one spectator asked.
The audience pointed out that the meeting was to have heard from both sides of the question, and that no one had come to present objections to the use of classroom prayers.
"Clearly, we must represent the majority of residents since no one in this audience object to prayers," one man stated.

MRS. GEORGE ROMNEY told the board she prayed for her son being was not divisive among various religions but should unite all men under a common brotherhood and teach respect for each other's religion.
The audience indicated to the board that they would return in full strength at the next board meeting to hear the board's final decision.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 175
AMENDMENT TO A MUNICIPAL
REGULATION ORDINANCE
CITY OF BIRMINGHAM
An ordinance to amend Ordinance No. 175, to read as follows: To Repeal Amusement, Etc. by modifying sections 4 and 5 thereof to permit the issuance of licenses effective for terms up to one year.
The City of Birmingham ordains: That Ordinance No. 175 of the City of Birmingham entitled Ordinance to Regulate Amusement, Etc. be amended by modifying sections 4 and 5 thereof to read as follows:
Section 4. Before any license as required by this ordinance shall be issued, the City Clerk shall collect by the City Clerk a fee for the amount of \$1.00, together with a fee of \$1.00 for each day for which such license is applying for, and the license shall be issued for a term of six months, unless otherwise provided. No license shall be assignable, transferable, and it shall always be displayed conspicuously on the premises where the license is used, either directly or indirectly.
Ordained the 17th day of December, A.D. 1961, by Commission of the City of Birmingham, to be effective upon publication.
