

## B'ham-B'field Bank Announces 4% Interest

Birmingham-Bloomfield Bank, 250 W. Martin, today became the first bank in the Birmingham area to announce that it will offer 4 per cent interest on time-certificates.

Bank President Charles D. White said that effective Jan. 1 four per cent interest will be paid on funds deposited for one year and three and one-half per cent on funds deposited for six months.

Certificates will be issued in multiples of \$500 and will be available to individuals, corporations and municipal, church and fraternal organizations.

WHITE SAID that when the bank opened in September, 1960, it offered the highest interest rates in the Birmingham area. He said that the Birmingham-Bloomfield Bank continues to give its depositors the benefit of the highest rate allowable on time savings certificates, issued by the Federal Reserve Bank.

Certificates are now available on all other deposits in the Birmingham-Bloomfield Bank are insured up to \$10,000 by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp.
