

B'ham Youth Arrested for Hit-and-Run

Michael R. Purton, 20, 1072 Wimbleson, Birmingham, is scheduled to appear before Judge George T. Murphy in Detroit's Traffic Court Friday for examination in the hit-and-run death of a Detroit resident.

Charged with leaving the scene of an accident, Purton was released to his parents Tuesday on \$1,000 bond.

The victim, Fred Jull, 45, died Saturday evening in Detroit's Receiving Hospital several hours

after he was struck while crossing Woodward at Ferry about 2:45 a.m.

PURTON ACCOMPANIED by his father, Kingsley Purton, and attorney Ivan Barris, surrendered to Birmingham police Saturday morning. He was later taken to Detroit for questioning.

Witnesses told police that the hit-run car was a dirty white 1960 or 1961 Thunderbird that sustained damage to the left front fender and lost its left rear view mirror.

According to Detroit police, pieces of mirror found at the scene of the accident match fragments missing from Purton's father's Thunderbird.

Jull, who suffered a fractured skull, was editor of the house organ of Rexair, Inc., a Detroit manufacturing firm.
