Officials to Discuss X-Ray's Affect On S'field Firms

SOUTHFIELD—The access road from the planned Northwest expressway in Southfield will be discussed soon when a representative of the State Highway Department meets with Southfield businessmen and city officials.

Irving Rubin, executive aide to Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie, will talk with the men who are complaining about the access road. Their property, now along existing Northwestern, would be along a frontage road north of the expressway and east of Telegraph when the Northwestern-Telegraph-East-West Expressway interchange is constructed.

UNDER PRESENT plans, motorists would have to leave the travel a round-about route to get to the business concerns. The businessmen would like an access directly from Northwestern.

Rubin said the highway department will study the situation to see if it can come up with a solution that would be reasonable.

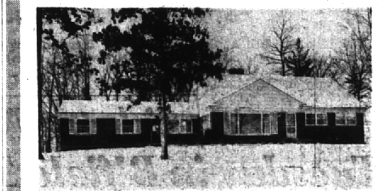

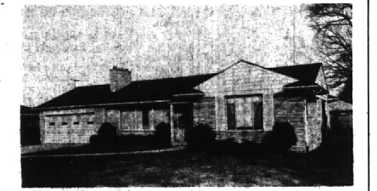

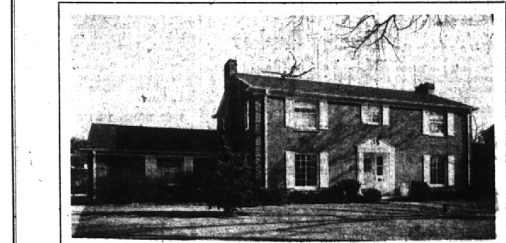
