Seeks to Stop Capitol Page 'Spoils System'

WASHINGTON—An end to the "spoils system" in appointing Capitol pages was sought last week by Cong. William S. Broomfield (R-Oakland) in a bill introduced in the House of Representatives. Broomfield proposed that pages be chosen on the basis of results of nationwide competitive examinations "without regard to race, color or creed." The bill, which calls for pages to be similar to last year's, "shall never get to first base," he said. "Congressmen were too jealous of their patronage to take selection of these boys out of partisan politics." Broomfield said Capitol pages, who run errands for Congressmen and who have a first-hand view of activities on the floor of the Capitol Building, were referred to the House Administration Committee for study.

BROOMFIELD had introduced a similar bill last year, "but it never got to first base," he said. "Congressmen were too jealous of their patronage to take selection of these boys out of partisan politics." Broomfield said Capitol pages, who run errands for Congressmen and who have a first-hand view of activities on the floor of the Capitol Building, were referred to the House Administration Committee for study.

"Education in government could be expanded considerably at the Capitol Page School and field trips could be arranged to government agencies," said Broomfield. Broomfield said many pages are "just wasting their time here. Many of them not even attend classes if they are here for relatively short periods of time. There is little supervision and no enforced study periods." Broomfield further urged that a six-man bipartisan Capitol Page Board be established to "insure that the greatest advantage is taken of this potential for a sound education in government."

Husband of Former Resident on Plane Lost over Atlantic

Mr. and Mrs. Howard Key Morgan, 1442 Inwoods Circle, Bloomfield Hills, have received word that their daughter's husband was one of the officers aboard a U.S. military air transport plane that disappeared over the Atlantic on Jan. 26. He was Lt. (j.g.) Daniel C. Dunlap, husband of Pamela Morgan Dunlap. His plane was enroute from Morocco to Norfolk, Va., and was lost off the coast of Newfoundland.

Lt. and Mrs. Dunlap were married last August in the Lower Lake residence of her parents. She will complete her teaching year at a Carrollton Oaks, Va., school; then will return to Bloomfield Hills for a visit in April and will be at home for the summer, her parents report.

Accidents Highest During December

Traffic accidents in Birmingham reached the highest total of the year during the month of December according to police Chief Ralph W. Moxley's monthly report. Police investigated a total of 93 accidents in December compared to 77 in November. In addition to the second fatal accident of the year occurring in December, there were also 22 personal injury accidents and 70 property damage accidents. The personal injury accidents resulted in injuries to 30 persons. OF THE 93 accidents investigated, 34 of them involved right-of-way violations. During the entire year this single violation was present in 265 of the 774 accidents investigated.
