

### Presbyterians Plan Series of Family Nights

A series of six family nights has been planned for the Lenten season by the First Presbyterian Church of Birmingham. Each Thursday evening beginning Feb. 16 and continuing through March 28, dinner will be held at 6:30 followed by a program.

The theme "The Christian Mission in Latin America" will be treated in a variety of ways to highlight each program. A play entitled "My Kaleidoscopic World" will be presented Feb. 16 by the Junior High drama group under the direction of Mrs. Scott Purvis.

"Show and Tell" night on Feb. 23 will consist of family presentations of Latin American treasures. SPEAKERS from Latin America will be featured at three of the evenings during March. Dr. James I. McCord, president of Princeton Theological Seminary, will speak on "A Teacher Tells About Brazil" on March 2. Dr. Robert C. Thorp will talk on his life as a missionary in Guatemala. March 22, will feature James H. Ross, M.D., a doctor from Mexico. Time will be celebrated March 9.

In the evening his subject will be "The Future of Religious Liberalism." Dr. Rice has been minister of the Unitarian Church of Wellesley Hills, Mass. since 1945. He has served as chairman of the committee on consolidation of the Unitarian and Universalist Churches of America and is a nominee for the office of president of the new united denomination.

### Classes To Begin At Incarnate Word

Lutheran Church of the Incarnate Word will begin pastor's classes Sunday for the purpose of instructing participants in the teachings, practices and worship of the United Lutheran Church. Classes will be held at 9:30 a. m. in the Auburn Heights community hall and will continue for six weeks.

Pastor Arthur J. Basler will conduct the sessions. The major Christian doctrines will be discussed from the Lutheran point of view, said pastor Basler, but care will be taken "not to forsake the practical for the doctrinaire."

### St. Bede's Begins \$136,239 Addition

Construction of a \$136,239.28 school addition was announced last week by St. Bede's Catholic Church in Southfield. According to the Rev. C. Keating, pastor, the addition will include six more classrooms.

An additional \$5,000 will be spent for the building permit due to the special assessment of the Evergreen Interceptor and about \$5,000 for furnishings.

CONSTRUCTION will begin immediately and is expected to be completed by Aug. 15. At present the school has nine classrooms with an enrollment of 400 students. Father Keating expects the September enrollment to exceed the 500 mark. J. Smith, Hinchman & Grills Associates, Inc. received the architectural and engineering contract. Charles Fromm Company of Detroit is the general contractor.

DURING HOLY WEEK services will be conducted on the evenings of Monday, Tuesday and Good Friday. Holy Communion will be celebrated on Maundy Thursday, and the Order of Tenebrae will be used on Good Friday.
