

Deadline Nearing For Dog Licenses In S'field Township

SOUTHFIELD TOWNSHIP — Dog owners in Bingham Farms, Franklin and the unincorporated areas of the township can secure licenses for their pets until March 1 at the township offices, 13300 W. 13 Mile Road.

The tags cost \$1 for male or unsexed dogs, and \$2 for females. After the March 1 deadline, the licenses will double in cost and will be available only from Oakland county authorities. A certificate of rabies vaccination must be presented before a license will be issued.
