Liquor Ordinances Get First Reading At Council Meeting

BEVERLY HILLS — Two ordinances regulating liquor purchase, possession or transportation by minors and its consumption in public places was read for the first time Monday at the village council meeting.

The ordinances carry a maximum fine of \$100 or 90 days in jail or both for any violations.

Both laws will provide avenues for stiffer enforcement by village police in the apprehension of minors in possession of liquor or drinking in public areas within the village.

VILLAGE OF BEVERLY HILLS ORDINANCE NO. 46

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE CONSUMPTION OF ALCOHOLIC LIQUORS ON PUBLIC HIGHWAYS, PROHIBITING THE CONSUMPTION OF ALCOHOLIC LIQUORS OTHER THAN BEER AND WINE, IN PUBLIC PARKS AND PLACES OF AMUSEMENT NOT LICENSED TO SELL FOR CONSUMPTION ON THE PREMISES, AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR A VIOLATION OF THE ORDINANCE.

THE VILAGE OF BEVERLY HILLS ORDAINS:

Section 1. No person shall consume any alcoholic liquor on any public highway.

Section 2. No person shall consume any alcoholic liquor, except beer and/or wine, in public parks and places of amusement not licensed to sell for consumption on the premises under the Michigan Liquor Control Act as now or hereafter amended.

Section 3. Any person who shall violate any provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction, shall be subject to a fine of not more than \$100.00 or to imprisonment in the county jail for not more than ninety (90) days, or to both such fine and imprisonment, in the discretion of the court.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect 10 days following its publication.

Science Program To Be Discussed At PTA Meeting

BLOOMFIELD VILLAGE — Parents of children at Bloomfield Village School will hear about the school's science program at a PTA meeting, Tuesday at 8 p.m.

Science tables for each grade, kindergarten through fifth grade, will be set up in the multi-purpose room and teachers will be on duty to explain the work of the individual class.
