City Projects For '60 Cost \$344,520

Total construction cost for projects completed during 1960 was \$344,520, the City Engineering Dept. informed the Birmingham City Commission this week.

In the department's annual report, City Engineer W. T. Killen listed as the major road improvement project the paving of Redding Road, "which was probably in the worst condition of any Birmingham street."

Existing broken-up concrete strip pavement was removed and a 29-foot concrete pavement with integral curb was constructed on Redding from Lakeland to Woodward. Cost was \$43,405.

Total paving costs were \$82,040.

DURING 1960, two 16-inch water mains about two and a half miles in length were constructed "as a major step towards providing an adequate distribution system."

Total cost of water main construction for completed projects was \$26,979.

Because of the Twelve Town Drain litigation situation, sewer relief projects were small in size. Total amount spent was \$24,059.

KILLEN SAID one of the top sidewalk projects of the year was the downtown sidewalk improvement program, which included Maple from Chester to Hunter and Woodward from Brown to Oakland.

Cost: \$26,979.

Several other projects, which the department helped to start last year, are not yet completed.

B'ham JA Fund At Half-Way Mark

Hills Resident Outlines GOP Party Philosophy

William T. Gossett of Bloomfield Hills described the philosophy of the Republican party as being "the very essence" of liberalism at the Oakland County 71st annual Lincoln Day banquet.

"True Republicanism and true liberalism are inseparable," the 66-year-old vice president and general counsel of Ford Motor Co. told an overflow audience at Glen Oaks Country Club.

"The Republican party is often charged with the crime of conservatism," Gossett said. "It is my conviction that the principles underlying Republicanism are the very essence of liberalism, and that liberalism is the heart of Republicanism."

GOSSETT DESCRIBED Republicanism as "trust in the ability of free men to solve their own problems and conduct their own affairs wisely without intervention of paternalistic, all-wise government."

Republicans, he said, should be the steady catalyst for social and political problems.

"We fight on steady, reasoned, mature growth and action in the American tradition," Gossett said. "Gossett defined Republican liberalism as a combination of freedom and responsibility that is the right of free birth." He urged his audience to follow the example of Abraham Lincoln.

Lincoln was effective both as a statesman and as a humanitarian not because he shut his eyes to the weakness and faults of human beings, but because in spite of these faults he still respected them, and appealed to that in them that was noble and fine," Gossett said.

"THIS IS THE legacy that he has left his party. It is our challenge to work with that legacy. In this century and under greatly changed conditions, we must

continue to demonstrate the validity of the truly liberal principle by applying it positively and constructively to the discussion and solution of the great issues and problems of our time," he added.

Gossett called on his party to exercise an important voice in the course of the U.S. will take in both domestic and foreign affairs.

"We can contribute another and very valuable point of view to the councils that set our country's course," he said.

"But we will not fulfill our function by giving way to hand-wringing or recrimination... by belittling the efforts of others, or seeking to stand against the main trend of human needs and the deeper aspirations of the people."

"WE WILL FULFILL it—and we will win respect and a place of leadership—to the extent, and only to the extent, that we contribute imaginative and constructive solutions to our state and national problems," Gossett concluded.

Gossett introduced Congressman Walter H. Judd (R., Minn.) who urged Republicans to stand true to their conservative principles.

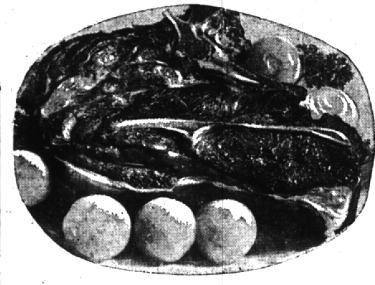
