BLOOMFIELD HILLS — The Bloomfield Hills Police Department has charged Calvin G. Barr, 17, of Pontiac, with leaving the scene of an injury accident.

According to police, Barr left the scene after forcing a car driven by John A. Hope, Jr., 17, of Clawson, into the parkway on Woodward north of Long Lake Road.

Hope was taken to St. Joseph Mercy Hospital, Pontiac, Saturday at 12:10 a.m. for treatment of head and face lacerations. He has since been discharged.

POLICE SAID that both cars were going at an excessive speed and Barr lost control of his car causing Hope's car to smash into a tree on the parkway.

Barr left and later returned in another vehicle, but did not identify himself, according to Hills' police. He also visited the hospital in an effort to discover Hope's condition.

Two alert Farmington boys, Clinton Willis and William L. Scott remembered Barr's license number and told police. Authorities picked up Barr at home.
