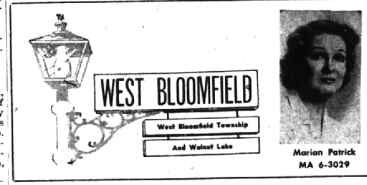
FOR THEIR wedding trip the bride traveled in a yellow wool sheath with black accessories.

Time Is Drawing Near For Spring Gardening

Some of our local gardeners have sought my advice on what they should be doing around this time. Simmer down and enjoy your garden vacation.

Do not cut down the "old" stalks which poke up through the snow for they will hold the future snow drifts and prevent winter-kills with your perennials.

Around March first is a good time to spread fertilizer on your lawn, especially if there is a little snow on the turf to guide your distribution. This can be your official spring feeding, and it will be a good time for the dilute fertilizer, after snow or rain, to feed the roots of the grass which are enjoying growth any day the temperature is 40 degrees.

THIS IS A GOOD time to saw off those branches which do not add appeal to the profile of a tree, especially if branches cross where constant rubbing can cause disease.

As we have been enjoying this winter, it doesn't seem cricket to mention that we will be short on the total supply of water to enrich the level of the water table. Therefore, plan your garden with knowledge of mulches to hold moisture in the soil.

If you have a sandy soil you should study now to put more humus into the total consistency of your soil by constant addition of Michigan Peat, compost, and mulch coverings for July and August.

IF YOU HAVE a new property development where you live why not consider being a collector of fine plant material?

For early spring flowering, I want to introduce you to the Cornelian Cherry (Cornus Ma). This tree will introduce you to a slow grower, but will have long-lived shrub comes into flower in
