LATHRUP — A city letter, sent to all citizens of Lathrup, informed them that the agendas of three regular council meetings will be held open for questions and discussion of the city's sewer program. Meetings will be opened at 9 p.m. on Monday, and also on March 6 and March 20. A representative of Ayres, Lewis, Norris and May, city engineers, will be present.

THE LETTER invited residents to become informed on the status of the storm and sanitary sewer programs and noted that the estimated \$525,000 storm water program will mean a cost to taxpayers of about \$1 per \$1000 of assessed valuation.

The four mill figure is in line with replies given by citizens in last spring's storm water questionnaires and special hearings.
