## Children's Night

A three-week delay in the closing of Birmingham's Child Guidance Clinic branch was approved Wednesday noon, pending a final appeal to the ways and means committee of the Oakland County Board of Supervisors for additional operating funds.

In what is practically a whirlwind effort, this "Friend of the Clinic" in the past six days has rallied mothers throughout the county in an effort to save the Clinic's present program.

JAMES RESTON, democratic chairman of Oakland County, Saturday urged the additional appropriation in separate letters to Republican County Chairman Arthur C. Elliott, Board of Supervisors Chairman DeLo Hamlin, and Ways and Means Committee Chairman David Levinson.

PUBLIC support of the Clinic's program has mushroomed since last week when the possible closing of the Birmingham branch was made known generally, according to Mrs. Jack Perlmutter, 5600 Devon Lane, Franklin.

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"OUR AID is simply this," Mrs. Perlmutter explained. "I am going to exert maximum coordinated pressure on our county officials to keep the Clinic's program at its present level—quality wise and volume-wise."

She said she and "hundreds of other people I've talked to" cannot understand why—with more than \$1 million in surplus funds this year—at least \$200,000 could be added to the \$32,500 which the county has allotted the clinic.

"Just one emotionally disturbed child in a classroom affects every mother," Mrs. Perlmutter emphasized. "Her child cannot get the attention that his teacher otherwise would be able to give him."

REPRESENTATIVES of the clinic met last Thursday with the county board of auditors with practically no result. Representatives were told the additional money is a matter for the ways and means committee to decide.

Ginn said in his letters to Elliott, Hamlin and Levinson: "I find it difficult to believe that the Board of Supervisors shall deny such a necessary and worthwhile cause this modest requirement, in view of the fact that there is an accumulated surplus of \$1,285,432 in the county treasury."

"Surely, the welfare of our children is more important than the building of palatial new offices for our county administrators. This becomes even more accentuated when the voters of our county rejected, only last August, a four mill and one-half cent tax to build these same buildings."

"I HOPE that you and your organization will join with us in supporting the appropriation of sufficient funds to meet the needs of the Birmingham office of the Oakland Child Guidance Clinic."

### James Reston Next Speaker At Town Hall

Mayor, City of Bloomfield Hills recently in my reading I came across the following historical coincidence which helped explain to me—as it may to other readers of this column—the tremendous spiritual, moral and philosophical gulf which separates Western civilization from the governments of the East behind the Iron and Bamboo Curtain.

In the year 1215 A.D.—as every high school history student knows—on the meadow at Runnymede on the banks of the River of Thames outside of London, 600 knights and nobles rebelled against the tyrannical behavior of the King John to grant that great charter of human liberty, called Magna Carta.

A reading of that document, which was in fact ready today reveals little promise of the growth of liberty, justice and equality under the law which is in fact stemmed from it.

IT WAS, HOWEVER, a giant stride forward along the path of liberty which has been steadily achieved, developed and improved under the common law of England since the year 1215.

## Missionary Anxious for Return to Congo

What does a medical missionary who has spent the best years of his life in the Congo think about after settling down to the peace and comfort of his Birmingham home?

Getting back to the distressed land and its people.

White, his wife and three children, were forced to leave their mission at Wembo Nyabala in Kasai province, Belgian Congo, under the new rebel government.

THE LAST OF FIVE doctors to leave, White is anxious "to return until more help can be found."

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THE WHITES EMBARKED on their overseas tour in 1957. After a year-and-a-half study of tropical medicine and the French language in Belgium, the family proceeded to the Congo.

Following the advice of African church leaders who could no longer guarantee their safety, the Whites closed the door on almost three years of missionary work.

"LUMUMBA was a very great tragedy," said White. "Even though he was misguided, he was a man of great courage and a man whom a large segment of natives were following."

White never Lumumba. He not only treated his father and brother under the mission hospital but he met and heard him speak to the villagers.

"LUMUMBA was a most eloquent speaker—seemingly fanatical in his desire for power," said study.

White's Congo tour of duty would have expired in March, but the one-year Stateside furlough was moved up when a state of anarchy was declared.
