Cold Weather Affects Parking In Birmingham

The week of Jan. 21-27 was not exactly a warm one.

In fact, it wasn't a very good one, weather-wise, for taking a parking meter survey.

Police Chief Ralph W. Moxley reported to Birmingham city commissioners Monday night that a survey was taken that week to compare with one taken in January a year ago.

METER REVENUES during the week "dropped to the lowest total since September, 1960," Moxley reported.

"It will be remembered," he said, "the weather during the week of Jan. 21-27 and the week of Jan. 28-31 was extremely cold. This type of weather adversely affects meter usage, due to the drop in shopper parking demand."

Reductions in meter revenue were reported throughout the city.

B'ham Store Thief To Be Sentenced

James A. Shelnut, 40, of Highland Park, pleaded guilty to charges of grand larceny before Circuit Court Judge Clark J. Adams Tuesday. He will be sentenced March 6.

Shelnut stole over \$3,000 worth of merchandise from Kay Cooley's women's apparel store at 190 W. Maple on Oct. 22 according to Birmingham police.

Disposition of the case was delayed until Shelnut finished a 90-day jail sentence in Ohio for traveling 100 miles an-hour the wrong way on the Ohio Turnpike.

Shelnut is now in Oakland County jail under \$2,600 bond.

Man Found Guilty Of Drunk Driving

BLOOMFIELD HILLS—A Pontiac man was convicted of drunk driving by a jury Tuesday in the Justice Court presided by A. J. Richardson, justice of the peace.

Frank Russell, 52, was picked up by Hills police Feb. 5. He pleaded not guilty at the Feb. 11 arraignment and demanded a trial by jury.

He was found guilty of the charges and fined \$100 plus \$15 costs, or 30 days in jail.

4 Area Men To Head UCS Committees

Four Birmingham-Bloomfield residents have been named to head committees for United Community Services.

They will head groups of metropolitan area citizens in conferring directly with UCS agencies receiving United Foundation support.

The four will direct committee efforts in reviewing yearly agency budgets and in recommending annual allocations.

THEY ARE: Philip D. French, Birmingham, assistant treasurer, Detroit Edison Co.; budget chairman for settlements and community centers. John H. Lamb, Bloomfield Hills, manager of purchases, Cadillac Motor Car Division; chairman, UCS salary standards committee. Fred Moskale, Birmingham; vice president, National Bank of Detroit; chairman for reviewing budgets of health clinics.

Robert B. Vogtlewe, Birmingham; partner in accounting firm of Pent, Marwick, Mitchell & Co., chairman for non-classified services.

ALL FOUR have been assigned to serve on the UCS central budget committee, which coordinates and administers all UCS budgeting activities.

This committee is responsible for annual appropriations involving nearly 60 per cent of the Torch Drive funds which are earmarked for 123 UCS services.

Metro-Calling Service Okayed for Birmingham

A new residential telephone service permitting customers to dial calls throughout the metropolitan area at a special monthly rate is being offered in Birmingham by Michigan Bell Telephone Co.

The new service, which will be tested in Birmingham on a one-year trial basis, will go into effect starting March 1.

Albert H. Warner, manager here for Michigan Bell, said customers may place orders for the new service either by phone or in person at the business office at 160 Martin.

Michigan Bell began making immediate preparations to place the new service into effect after plans for Metro-calling were approved Monday by the Michigan Public Service Commission.

INCLUDED in the \$10.50 monthly rate for the new service are the cost of one-party line service and unlimited calling within Birmingham's present local calling area.

Warner said the metropolitan feature of the plan will provide for unlimited calling from Birmingham to the metropolitan area after 6 p.m. daily and all day on Sundays, Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year's Day. Regular charges will apply for calls made at other times to telephones in the metropolitan area outside Birmingham's local calling area.

Birmingham customers—like all other suburban customers—now pay additional charges for all calls made to telephones outside their local calling area.

WARNER SAID Birmingham customers will be able to dial calls for the special monthly rate to about half the telephones in Michigan.

Seventy-one communities are located in the calling area for Birmingham customers who subscribe to Metro-Calling Service. Included are all of Detroit, virtually all of Wayne County and many communities adjacent to the Birmingham local calling area.

Warner said the new service is a step toward simplifying rates and more efficiently meeting the service needs of customers.

As a result of the trial, this plan, a modification of it, or an entirely new one may be developed as a possible service offering to customers in the metropolitan area, he said.
