Franklin Council Tidies Agenda Before Election

FRANKLIN—Tide ends of the month's agenda were disposed of by the Franklin council Monday night as they put the official house in order prior to the annual village election. March 3.

Reviewing recommendations of the audit committee's report, minor adjustments were made in bookkeeping procedures with retiring treasurer Robert Winkel.

The council also agreed to make arrangements for a series of "family" portraits and will have photographs made of each representative since incorporation. President Calvert Thomas suggested that posters would appreciate a graphic record of the men who have served the community.

COUNCILMAN Don Hunter reported that he headed a committee that met with officers of the Birmingham Library recently, to re-

evaluate the needs and facilities in the broader community. He stated that Franklin's growth was being given due consideration, but concluded that further studies and discussions would be necessary before arriving at any new agreement with its sister community.

Ex-councilman Eugene Kawecik and Mrs. Carl Rasmussen are serving on the committee appointed by Thomas.

PROPOSED ORDINANCES regulating soliciting, dogs and road construction were shelved until the election is over.

Councilman Robert Mitchell reported that there were no new developments in the matter of a franchise with the Consumers Power Co.

Village departments were advised to prepare budgets for the next regular meeting of the council, to be held March 28 with newly elected members present.

WEST BLOOMFIELD—Walter F. Szelepsi, 39, of 3671 Pincock St., was killed Saturday night when he smashed into a tree on Commerce Road, after losing control of his car.

Deal on arrival at Pontiac General Hospital, he suffered a fractured skull, fractured neck and crushed chest. The accident occurred at 10:21 p.m. near Hiller Road. The car apparently skidded into the tree after going into mud on the side of the road, sheriff's deputies said.

Szelepsi was the 10th auto fatality of the year in Oakland County.

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
