Former Birmingham resident and Cranbrook student Patricia Newhall had just taken over the lead role in the New York Marquee production of La Ronde.

Eight people were injured in a four-car accident at Maple and Telegraph when a semi-truck driver ran a stop light and smashed

into two other cars which set off a chain-reaction of collisions.

Issue of July 21

A 17-year-old Bloomfield township boy drowned while skin diving in Gilbert Lake. The tragedy set off a series of demands from area lawmakers for more effective state legislation to control the sale and rental of skin diving equipment.

Dr. Otis M. Dickey of Grosse Pointe was named to succeed Dr. Dwight B. Ireland as Birmingham's new superintendent of schools after Ireland had resigned the position.

The Nottingham Forest Subdivision west of Labor on 14 Mile road in Beverly Hills formally opened. The 236-foot development is presently occupied Oakland county's last virgin timber area.

Plans were announced to begin the \$215,000 widening of Maple road from Cranbrook to Telegraph by the county.

Pro golfer Walter E. Burkemo of Birmingham was the only top money winner (\$300) of the three Michigan golfers who competed in the 57th Western Open Golf tournament.

Issue of July 28

The Southfield City Council voted to fire City Administrator Robert J. McNutt. Councilman John J. Hollywood presented a 10-page statement charging McNutt with collusion and deceit of the council to support his resolution to fire him.

The Chester C. Sharps gave a cocktail party in honor of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Bagwell of Lansing.

A new post office was authorized for Lathrup according to Congressman William Broomefield. The site is planned for the northwest corner of Southfield and Glenwood Boulevard.

The second of three major road improvement projects at 14 Mile between Telegraph and Franklin in Bloomfield Township got underway. Estimated cost of the project was \$55,000.

The major league baseball teams of the Birmingham Little League prepared for the district No. 4 tournament held at Eton Park with the winner getting a crack at the state title.

Issue of Aug. 4

Birmingham voters favored James Hare (Dem.) for governor and turned down two county tax propositions in the Oakland County primary elections. The county and the state, however, favored John Swanson while also rejecting the tax propositions.

The Oakland County Department of Public Works Board planned a meeting to discuss legal action against Detroit for the city's refusal to accept flow from the Evergreen and Farmington interceptors.

The Cranbrook Academy of Art received two new faculty members. Lawrence A. Barker took over as head of the new department of graphics and Howard O. Brown replaced Charles Metcalf as head of the industrial design department.

The voters of Southfield, West Bloomfield and Bloomfield townships decided against continuing the annual township meetings by a considerable majority. Reasons offered for abolishment of the meetings were poor attendance, minority rule and inaccurate and indecisive voice vote.

Issue of Aug. 11

Mrs. Hugh Muncie, of Beverly Hills, saved two young boys from drowning while she and her family were vacationing near Amherstburg, Can.

Issue of Aug. 18

Local parents protested Birmingham schools' scheduled starting time of 9:30 a.m. for elementary students. Parents, who wanted an earlier starting time, claimed the now proposed time was too impractical.

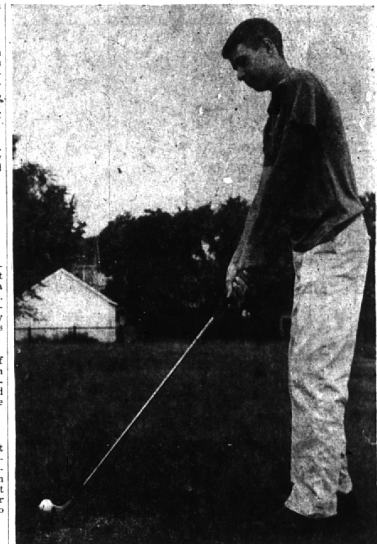
The Beverly Hills council voted against the construction of two 10-story apartment buildings proposed for the 13 Mile-Evergreen intersection in the Village.

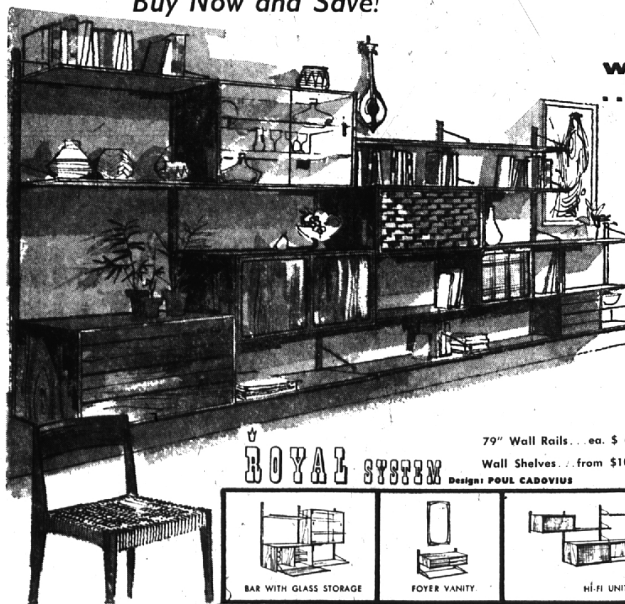


Model Assists Amies

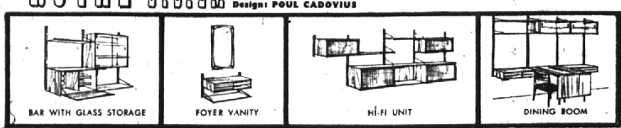
