Council Opposes Asphalt Paving In Lathrup

LATHRUP — The city moved a step closer to improvement of its roads Monday by adopting a resolution that put it on record as opposed to any new asphalt paving construction, except over a concrete base.

The four-part resolution stated that the city would not accept petitions for new asphalt paving construction, before June 30, of that type so far constructed, pending the development of specifications for concrete construction by City Administrator Jerald Stone.

He will be assisted in developing the specifications by the Road and Traffic Safety Advisory Committee.

The resolution accepted the report of the latter committee and noted that the committee had found the cost of maintenance and construction of asphalt paving to be impractical, Ray Heym is committee chairman.

Philanthropic Club to Aid Fire, Policemen

BEVERLY HILLS — At Tuesday's council meeting, Councilman Ted Shurtleff announced that the Beverly Hills Department of Public Safety has been chosen by the 100 Club as a recipient of its traditional benevolent acts.

In the event of death or injury to a member of the Beverly Hills Police or Fire Department while on duty, the 100 Club has pledged to assist the distressed family.

Shurtleff also pointed out that due to the efforts of the public safety department, Beverly Hills has enjoyed a "death-free" record in the past three years. No fatal traffic accidents have occurred, he said.

Shurtleff said Beverly should have been included among other communities cited for clean records. Shurtleff also warned his colleagues to anticipate appeals on the recent downtown-disconnecting ordinance.

"We must remember, however," he said, "the burden of proof rests with the appellant, not the council."

Adult Education Classes in S'field Start January 23
