

## New Yellow Pages Are On the Way

Michigan Bell Telephone Company is in the process of delivering some 166,000 copies of its area Yellow Pages in Birmingham and in nineteen other communities, according to Albert H. Warner, manager of the Birmingham office. The communities receiving the new Yellow Pages are: Berkeley, Beverly Hills, Birmingham, Bloomfield Hills, Bloomfield Township, Clawson, Ferndale, Franklin, Hazel Park, Huntington Woods, Lathrup Village, Madison Heights, Mayfair, Oak Park, Pleasant Ridge, Royal Oak, Royal Oak Township, Southfield, Troy, and West Bloomfield.

These communities make up the five exchanges—Birmingham, Mayfair, Royal Oak, Southfield, and Troy—which are included in the new directory.

The NEW directory is the one which should be used when looking up classified headings and listings because it reflects the additions and changes which have occurred since the last Yellow Pages directory was issued. Warner said. When the new directory is delivered, the old one will be picked up.

## Oakland County Observes National Big Brother Week

This week, Jan. 8 through 15, is being observed as National Big Brother Week by Big Brothers of America. Locally, this observance is conducted by the Big Brothers of Oakland County.

William L. Clark, executive director, stressed the importance of this week, explaining the purpose: to inform the general public of the Big Brother movement and to interest men throughout the county in becoming active Big Brothers.

The basic purpose of the Big Brother movement is to establish a meaningful relationship between a man and a boy on a "one man to one boy" basis. The objective is to help each boy reach his highest physical, mental, emotional and spiritual development.

CLARK EXPLAINED the Big Brother as being a volunteer who gives fully of himself to guide and befriend a boy with problems, a boy who is in need of a mature man's companionship.

After careful screening and training, a Big Brother is matched with a boy of the same religious faith, and one who shares similar

interests.

With the counsel of a professional social work staff always at hand, the Big Brother builds a close and meaningful friendship with the boy.

THE LITTLE BROTHER is a boy who is beginning to show personality problems, often stemming from a breakdown in his home. His problems may take the form of school failure, family conflict, or

a general loss of meaning in his life.

Clark praised the men who have given of themselves in behalf of the youth in Oakland County and who have helped many boys through Big Brother work to reach a goal of productive maturity.

A need for more volunteers in this program is most urgent at this time, Clark said. He suggested that interested parties contact Big Brothers of Oakland County, 132 Franklin boulevard, Pontiac.
