

# Expect Elliott Decision Jan. 17 On State GOP Job

Oakland County Republican Chairman Arthur G. Elliott is expected to announce by Jan. 17 his decision as to whether to seek the state GOP chairmanship.

Present State Chairman Lawrence B. Lindome has announced that he will not seek a third term. His successor will be chosen at the state convention Feb. 3 and 4 in Detroit.

Lindome said he feels there are "several competent candidates" available for the post. He was elected state chairman in February, 1957.

ELLIOTT, 43, lives in Pleasant Ridge. He has been county chairman since 1957. Local observers feel that Elliott has the inside track for the state job if he wants it.

Oakland Republicans will have the biggest vote in the state convention. They will meet Jan. 18 to choose delegates and alternates to the party.

Robert J. McIntosh, former 7th District congressman, appears to be Elliott's main competition.

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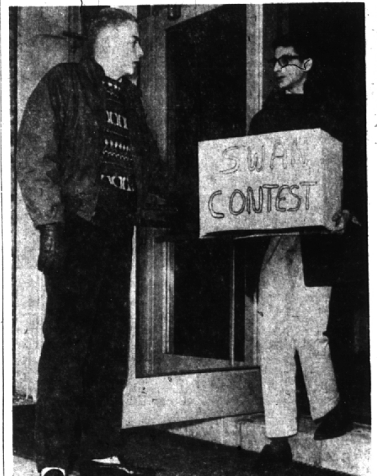

## Savings-Loan Firm Reports '60 Good Year

Despite a general leveling off in business in 1960, Birmingham Federal Savings and Loan Association had an excellent year, with assets increasing to \$30,450,298, Henry Johnson, president, reported. Johnson said the year was marked by record gains in savings and savers, with many individuals and families sleeping up their savings programs "in part because of caution, but also because they have developed systematic savings habits."

The high savings level, coupled with increasing repayments on outstanding mortgages, assures an ample supply of home mortgage money for home buyers in 1961, he said.

HE LISTED highlights of Birmingham Federal Savings and Loan Association's 1960 operation as follows:

1. Net savings increased by \$3,021,879, boosting total savings capital to \$28,629,835 at year's end.
2. Savers increased by 2,718 and total savings account holders now stand at 16,371.
3. Dividend payments to savers totaled \$894,677, an all-time high.
4. The dollar value of the home mortgage loan portfolio increased to \$4,196,210 at year's end.

Johnson suggested that the recent slowdown in business probably contains in itself the "seeds of its own recovery." He listed as "plus factors" a continued high level of sales and production, employment and personal income.

Today, the Big Brothers of America, celebrating their 50th birthday this week, announced that the picture is being adopted for the organization's national literature.

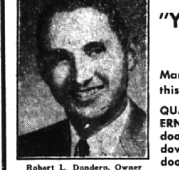
It will be distributed across the country as the cover illustration of an eight-page brochure and will appear on the front of the program for the Big Brother national convention, to be held in Flint May 10-13.
