Mother Explains Mystery Element In Fatal Crash

SOUTHFIELD — The mystery behind why a Southfield youth, who died in an automobile accident, was rushing to a hospital was solved Tuesday by the youth's mother.

Mrs. Jane Baker, of Royal Oak, told police that her son, Robert, 18, who lived at 30065 Fairfax, Southfield, had suffered from a respiratory ailment that cut off his breathing.

Baker and his companion, John W. Walker Jr., 19, of Berkeley, frantically sought directions to the nearest hospital Monday from a youth at a Farmington drive-in.

WENDELL DUELL, 20, led the way for them. When he looked in his mirror, the auto behind him had crashed into a telephone pole. Walker was reported in critical condition at Wayne County General Hospital. An autopsy showed that Baker apparently died of shock. His only apparent injuries were a fractured wrist and ankle.

West Bloomfield To Screen Business Personal Tax Roll

of business personal taxes. Forms filling the tax were mailed this week.

COMPUTATION OF individual taxes owed are based on methods advised by the Oakland County Equalization Board, Rehard stated, and the township will meet its own investigations of personal property upon which the tax is levied.

Township officials will also attempt to search out businesses which have not made out personal tax forms in previous years, according to Rehard.

McBurney was caught between the bucket and the stabilizer of a loaderback hoe tractor. He was taken to Reiford Medical Center. His condition was reported satisfactory Wednesday morning.

Q. Is it harmful for a person to "put off" going to the bathroom to urinate? A. Probably not, for males. For females it might definitely be harmful. The reason is that the female urethra (tube leading from bladder) is short. Unless it is frequently flushed out by urination, it is allowed for bacteria to get up into the bladder and cause infection. This would be less likely to occur when the urge is resisted.

Q. If bloodless urine (urine normal after a day or so should you see a doctor)? A. Yes. You should have a thorough examination if you ever have blood in the urine. Otherwise, you are risking what could be a symptom of a serious condition requiring prompt treatment.

Q. Does the chilling of milk affect the vitamins and protein content? A. No.

Pinworms leave the lower intestinal tract of an infected person and lay eggs on the skin around the anal opening.
