**PNH Wallops Department Plans Southfield City Recreation**

Southfield got the jitters when Pontiac Northern applied a full court pressing defense, and lost decisively, 10-0, Friday night at Pontiac.

It was the second Inter-Lakes league win for Northern. Their season record stands at 1-1. Southfield is now 0-2.

The Blue Jays of Southfield jumped to a 7-2 lead in the first quarter, with Mike Forrester and Ted Mallon controlling the boards. At the end of the quarter, Southfield was able to hold a 10-10 lead.

IN THE SECOND QUARTER, the Huskies press became exceptionally effective, as Southfield started throwing the ball away trying to reach center court.

Northern scored three consecutive baskets to go ahead 16-15, a lead they never lost.

Steve Thompson and Jerry Bell led Northern in rebounding as Southfield began to get frantic, and take exceptionally long shots.

THE BLUE JAYS out rebounded Southfield, 65-59, with Thompson getting 14.

Mike Fedynik, of Northern, led all scorers with 19 points. Forrester led Southfield with 14 points. Joe Andrews collected 11.

**Check Ice, Fishermen!**

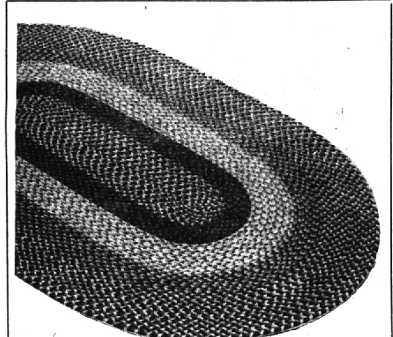
Planning to ice fish this weekend? Although ice has formed on inland waters in most parts of the state, extreme caution should still be used.

A few anglers have already found themselves being "fished" from thinly-covered lakes which, on the surface, may have looked safe enough.

Fishermen will be wise to check lakes before hauling their shanties and other gear onto ice. Checking around shores will give a quick clue to conditions. When the lake's ice is thin, it will break up first around the shore.

Discolored ice is often a good sign of danger.

Parties of fishermen should spread out. When four or five anglers mingle in a small area, it's sometimes more than the ice can support.
