Jack Minor Files \$25,000 Suit Against Chrysler

Jack W. Minor, a Birmingham resident and former marketing director for Chrysler's Plymouth, DeSoto-Vauxair division, filed a \$25,000 suit against the firm Tuesday.

L. L. (Tex) Colbert, Chrysler president and a resident of Bloomfield Hills, and the Chrysler Thrift Stock Ownership Program were named in the suit filed in Wayne County Circuit Court.

THE SUIT CHARGES that Minor is entitled to recover his contributions and dividends earned during a 50-month period of participation in the stock program.

Minor resigned from Chrysler Sept. 30 at the request of Chrysler because of his interest in firms doing business with the auto company.

Danish Ambassador to Unveil Exhibit at Cranbrook Institute

His Excellency Count Kjeld Gustav Knuth-Winterfeldt, Danish Ambassador to the United States, will unveil the exhibit "Two Centuries of Oceanography" at the Cranbrook Institute of Science on Jan. 26.

The exhibit, a survey of ocean studies made by Danish scientists, consists of a part of the exhibition of Science through Feb. 25.

It is sponsored by the Carlsberg Foundation of Copenhagen and the Smithsonian Institution and has been displayed at the Smithsonian, Washington, D.C., and the Harvard University, Cranbrook is the third and final place selected for the exhibit's American tour.

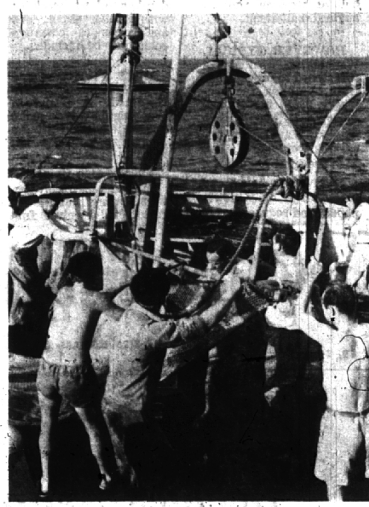
FROM A MODEST beginning in 1701, at a time when many parts of the world remained unexplored, ocean study by Denmark developed into the first expedition by the oceanographic ship Galathea which circumnavigated the world in 1846-47.

In addition to the historical survey, the exhibit shows examples of deep sea animals. Some are from the ocean trenches, from depths of 20,000 feet to more than 30,000 feet, including the Mariana Trench in the Philippine Sea, deep spots in all the oceans. Specimens from this and some from other great depths are the very first discovered.

Featured is a "missing link" in evolution, a mollusk called Neopilina galathea which belongs to a primitive group known only as fossils in sediments more than 350 million years old.

"IT RANKS," says a Galathea report, "among the greatest biological discoveries of this century" and may be considered a living fossil, one of the most remarkable known in science.

Following the public unveiling, Count Knuth-Winterfeldt will be honored at the Kingsley Inn, at 7:30 p.m. Dinner reservations may be made with Mrs. Chester Hard at the Cranbrook Institute of Science.



Exploring the Unknown

There is a desperate need for blood donors from Birmingham and surrounding communities, says Mrs. George Weinhoff, donor recruitment chairman for the Birmingham-Bloomfield area.

"We wish to call this attention to the attention of our local people and urge them to be donors," declared Mrs. Weinhoff.

SHE SAID the goal for a blood collection this afternoon is 200 pints, but admits that "far less" than that has signed up so far donors.

Today's collection will be at the Red Cross bloodmobile (unit at Birmingham Unitarian Church, on Woodward just north of Lone Pine. Hours will be from 2:45 to 4:45 and from 5:45 to 8:45 p.m.

DONORS/WISHING to make an appointment may contact Mrs. Clayton Gordon at 1099 Cranbrook, Birmingham, or Mrs. Weinhoff at 451 Pilgrim Road. From 15 to 20 volunteer workers will be on hand for the drive today.

"Blood is medicine," says Mrs. Weinhoff, "and it only comes from the veins of healthy people willing to give it."

MRS. WEINHOFF says the Detroit Regional Blood Center is down to 200 pints, a danger point. Usually, from 800 to 900 pints a month come from donors in Oakland County and are used for county residents in county hospitals, she adds.
